# CatSU student-beneficiaries receive TES grant AY 2021 - 2022

In time for the Holidays, student grantees of the Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES) of Catanduanes State University received the grant amounting to Twenty Thousand Pesos (PHP 20,000) per semester.

The TES distribution for First Semester Academic Year 2021-2022 were scheduled for three (3) consecutive Saturdays beginning October, while for Second Semester 2021-2022 started in December, and was held at the Open Court, in coordination and facilitation with the management staff of the Office of Admission and Registration Services (OARS), Office of Student Support Services (OSSS), and assistance from the Cashiering Services.

A total of 732 grantees for First

Semester AY 2021-2022, and 712 for Second Semester AY 2021-2022, received the TES. According to Ms. Marilyn G. Tejada, University Registrar and TES Focal person, this years grant distribution is very timely especially with the comeback of face – to- face classes where students are financially challenged and needing monetary assistance to help them with academic requirements.

"May this truly help them as they bear with the adjustments, they've gone though in switching back to onsite with blended learning modality!, Ms. Tejada said.

The Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES) is a government grants-in-aid program under Republic Act (RA) 10931 that gives Forty Thousand Pesos (PHP 40,000) per school year to financially deprived Filipino students who enroll in their first undergraduatepost-secondary program in SUCs and CHED recognized local universities and colleges (LUCs) as well to those studying in private higher education institutions (HEIs) and public schools in municipalities and cities.

# CatSU holds orientation-workshop on SPMS preparation

Aimed to ensure the establishment of a clear vision of the universitys direction and goals for 2023, the office of Vice-president for Administrative and Financial Affairs, headed by Dr. Maria Edna R. Iñigo, held a one-day training workshop entitled "Orientation/ Workshop on preparation of Strategic Performance Management System (SPMS)", on December 6, 2022 at CatSU Accreditation Room.

The activity likewise intends to promote awareness of responsibilities among the employees of their significant organizational roles, how to run their respective units, and work effectively towards the realization of the CatSU Presidents Vision of HOPE.

The objectives include the preparation of SPMS Forms that consists of Division/Unit Work Plan (D/UWP) for 2023, Office Performance Commitment Review (OPCR) Form, Individual Performance Commitment Review (IPCR) Form, D/O/IPCR Monitoring Schedule, and the Discussion of the workflow of submission of SPMS Forms and Updated SPMS Calendar.

The workshop, which is mandated by the Civil Service Commission, was facilitated by the university's Human Resource Management Services headed by Ms. Ma. Sionne May Crispino. The Head of Offices of the University from the Administrative and Financial Affairs Division and the Central management were in attendance. Also in participation were the CatSU Performance Management Team from the Panganiban Campus, SPMS Technical Working Group, and Unit representatives.

This mirror activity is a follow up of the pioneering initiative made only after 50 years of the university's conception and further intends to strengthen the current leaderships call for transparency, integrity, and accountability, thus would help and motivate employee performance according to or beyond the expectations of the taxpaying public.

"This activity serves as a focal point of the university in making sure that we are able to refocus our direction and review the different activities that we do in the Performance Management Systems. Having a PMS in place is an integral component of the Human Resource Management", Dr. Iñigo said.

'May we have that sense of belongingness, take responsibility, claim ownership for the attainment of the institutions VMGO. Today, I hope that you have picked up all the information which should pave the way to a clear direction in the preparation of SPMS forms", she ended.

SPMS is focused on linking individual performance vis-a-vis the agency's organizational vision, mission, and strategic goals. It is envisioned as technology composed of strategies, methods, and tools for ensuring fulfillment of the functions of the offices and its personnel as well as for assessing the accomplishments.

After the 3-day brawls of the four (4) competing powerhouse units under the scorching heat of the sun, and heavy downpour in the afternoon, Unit 2 emerged victorious and claimed the throne as champions in the Catanduanes State University (CatSU) Olympics 2022.

The blue team, which is composed of College of Agriculture and Fisheries (CAF), College of Science (COS), and College of Education (COEd), bagged 96 gold medals, 62 silver medals, and 65 bronze medals based on the official and final result of the Committee on Clerk-of-Course headed by Pof. Anne F. Gianan, chairperson of the Mathematics Department.

Unit 2 dominated the Arnis (Men and Women), Athletics (Women), Badminton (Women), Dancesport, Lawn Tennis (Women), Softball, Swimming (Men and Women), Taekwondo (Women), and Volleyball (Men).

The champs also are the second best in Basketball (Women), Chess (Men and Women), Lawn Tennis (Men), Sepak Takraw, Volleyball (Women), Beach Volleyball (Women), and Ms. CatSU Olympics.

Earning the first runner up is Unit IV, composed of College of Health Sciences (CHS), College of Humanities and Social Sciences (CHUMSS), and College of Industrial Technology (CIT). The red team reaped 64 gold, 52 silver, and 94 bronze. They were the victors in Athletics (Men), Baseball, Basketball (Women), Futsal, Table Tennis (Men and Women), Taekwondo (Men), Volleyball (Women), and Ms. CatSU Olympics.

Ranking as second runner up is Unit III composed of College of Business and Accountancy (CBA), College of Information and Communications Technology (CICT), and College of Engineering and Architecture (CEA). The yellows owned the sports in Chess (Men and Women), Football, Basketball Men (3x3 and 5x5) and Sepak Takraw.

Meanwhile, Unit 1 or the Green team of CatSU – Panganiban Campus got the third runner up rank with 13 gold, 31 silver, and 18 bronze. The team form the North displayed its dominance in Boxing (Men).

The CatSU Olympics 2022 had its awarding ceremony at the CatSU Oval, which also featured the field demonstration of 4,260 students from the collegiate and high school level.

"I am happy that finally, after two years, we were able to have the CatSU Olympics which we had been waiting for. May you continue the spirit of sportsmanship and camaraderie, especially in playing the sports that you truly love," Dr. Lily P. Custodio, Vice President for Academic Affairs and Officer-in-charge, said.

Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza, CatSU SUC President III, also expressed his congratulatory message to all CatSUans who made the event possible.

"Let us work altogether in facing the challenges that involve sports development. With the comeback of CatSU Olympics, may this event be an inspiration to everyone to continue focusing on fitness and wellness," Dr. Azanza said.

"Congratulations CatSUans for demonstrating the relevance of sports and our values that have been strengthened in this otherwise dark times of global pandemic."

The Yellows showed off their radiant moves as they competed against the blazing Red smashers of Unit 4 in the championship match held on Tuesday, December 6, at CatSU Gymnasium.

In singles badminton, Mark Jun Añonuevo of Unit 3 took over the floor against Ivan Olfindo of Unit 4.

Both players started off the game with an intense energy, throwing strong and solid smashes against each other which led to an almost close fight.

The yellow smasher kept the fire burning and released flashing smashes to secure

an advantage over the blazing Olfindo ending up with a landslide, 21-11. Añonuevo continuously released striking solid smashes making it hard for his opponent to take good shots, securing another decisive victory, 21-8.

In doubles badminton, John Zeke Miniano and King Chester Tatad of Unit 3 claimed their success after a three-set close match against Unit 4s Leo De Quiros and Nicanor Alpon.

The unpredictable results of the match was felt on the first set of the game as the two fiery pairs were assertive in taking

sliding smashes against each other. However, the yellows managed to faze their opponent ending the set in their favor, 22-20. Despite the loss, the red pair maintained their head up and continued to strike solid shots, winning the second set of the game with a five-point deficit, 21-16.

The striking fire nearly burnt the court on the third set as the two opposing teams both showed their tenacity to claim the victory, leading to a drawn out ending score of 26-24.

"Sobrang intense ng laban, kaya kami kabado, pressured. Kahuna ko madadaog na kami nung kada galamang sila ng score, kaya nakaugma na nanggana kami ," says Miniano during a quick interview after the game.

Tatad also shared that they underwent vigorous training everyday in preparation for the upcoming event from 4:00-5:00 PM and were glad that their team efforts were not in vain.

"Supportive ni coach, kung gatraining kami minsan igwa ng naenot na gakawat, si Sir gagibo paraan para lang makakawat kami," Miniano added, acknowledging their coachs contribution to their victory.

## Vargas comes back with a gold after an overwhelming defeat

After losing in the hands of Unit 2 jock Ryster Villarete in the elimination game, Dyn Ryk Vargas of Unit 3 turned the table as he bagged the gold medal in Lawn Tennis Singles Category on Tuesday, December 6.

Vargas again played with Villarete on the opposite side of the court in the first game of the best-of-three matches. At the start of the game, the tennis court was fired up with the fervor of the rivals to win the game. Vargas snared an early three-point lead, pushing Villarete to double his efforts, which was however proved to be in vain due to his errors, 5-2.

Unit 3 smasher, however, ramped up the pressure and sealed the victory with Villaretes unforced error, 8-3.

In an interview, Vargas explained how he turned the tides in the championship game with the same opponent who defeated him in a landslide score of 6-1 in the qualifying round.

Meanwhile, in the second game of the championships, Luis Emmanuel Macero of Unit 2 smashed Yellows Jerome Obogne leaving the latter to crumble in defeat, 8-0.

But the winning streak of the blue team ended in the third game as their bet Renz Bautista was bested by Unit 3s Kim Anthony Torillos with an 8-4 final score.

Villarete picked himself up and worked on his defense, stealing a point from offensive Vargas.

corporate organization, headed by Dr. Ma. Cecilia L. Zantua, Managing Director of ARDCI Foundation. According to Dr. Zantua, the Student Pantry is an ARDCI Foundation project through a donation of its corporate organization, the ARDCI Microfinancing Inc., that is envisioned to help the students especially upon learning that most often than not, they would sacrifice to skip meals just to save their allowance for some other schools needs. She further said that this this project is not just a project to help people in need but also a project of honesty and kindness.

"It is a test of kindness as we look for people who can give what they can, and Honesty – for students to get only what they need, and to think about the rest too who like them are also in need. It is a challenge to the heart", Dr. Zantua said. Ms. Karie Ann V. Santos, Project Manager shared that the general mechanism is like that of the community pantry during

the pandemic with those students included in the low-income families as target beneficiaries. "We encourage the students to avail of the program, they can get from here some of their basic daily needs like

canned goods, biscuits, and the like. Also we encourage other students, employees, faculty, friends and acquaintances with generous hearts to share your blessing here at the CatSU Student Pantry. We can't do this alone; we'll also need help from our community members so we can help our future professionals to be successful by simply providing some of their basic needs', Ms. Santos said.

Meanwhile, Dr. Aida A. Dianela, one of ARDCIs consultants, and a former CatSU Director of Student Affairs of CatSU, and also a member of the CatSU Board of Regents, was happy to share about the Student Pantry.

"We are here to help those who are so disenfranchised in life and I see that the happiness, the love, the caring is so great, it is at its maximum height", Dr. Dianela gladly shared.

Dr. Dianela, in closing, enjoined everyone from CATSU to share, especially those who may already have extras, to help in sharing to those who have little or less in life.

"Whats important is we help make peoples lives light, lighter, happier and more meaningful by what we have done. Let us always remember that it is really not what we give that matters, but it is what we share because a gift without the giver is bare", Dr. Dianela said.

The pantry, located at the pavilion of the former Office of Student Support Services, is open from 8AM - 6PM, Mondays through Saturdays. All students are welcome to use the pantry once a week, and only need their student ID to gain access to its multitude of free resources — including canned goods, hygiene products, biscuits and more.
