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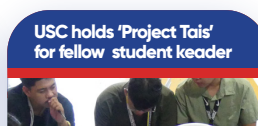

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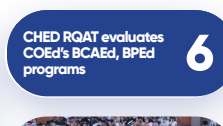
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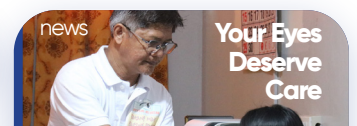
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Meeting students' need for mental health: GCTO, Peer Hub Club hold 'Adjustment Session' for freshmen students

CEA Dean to students at intellectual property rights training: Secure a patent first before publishing your inventions

College of Engineering and Architecture (CEA) Dean Engr. Dexter M. Toyado urged the engineering students to secure a patent first before publishing their inventions in public domain during the 'Intellectual Property Rights Training' on September 24, 2024.

"If you publish your inventions in a journal, newspaper, library, internet, or demonstrate, sell, or discuss your invention in public before you file a patent application, you cannot get a patent for lacking novelty," Engr. Toyado told the student-participants.

In the first part of the session, Engr. Rene Constantine Avila stressed that understanding IP rights is crucial for future engineers as this not only

promotes protection for individual innovations but also fosters a culture of creativity and progress.

Highlighting clarity in patent applications, Engr. Coleen May B. Yusores, discussed the common objections and the importance of demonstrating novelty and clarity in the application process of one's invention, which could influence the approval outcomes.

For Engr. Mekaela Louise B. Taroy, thorough research is vital for identifying potential barriers and opportunities in the IP landscape.

Held at the CEA Center Wing, 116 fourth-year students joined the said event.

CatSU's 10 adopted orgs to receive livelihood aid worth 7M from DOLE

With the help of the Padagos na Patanos Extension Program, CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza announced on September 3, that ten organizations partnered with the University will receive a total of 7 million pesos grant from the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE).

"Matapos ang ilang buwan ng aktibong assistance ng CatSU sa ilalim ng Padagos Na Patanos Extension Program, for release na sa September 16, 2024 ang pondong pampuhunan mula sa DOLE," Dr. Azanza stated on his social media page.

This assistance is part of the DOLE Integrated Livelihood

Program (DILP), also known as the Kabuhayan Program, which aims to support marginalized groups such as the self-employed, unpaid family members, low-wage workers, and seasonal workers.

One of the ten organizations assisted by CatSU, CALIPCOOP Meat Processing, will receive the largest investment, amounting to P1.5 million.

PAWOHA Marketing and Production of Garments and Accessories (P499,901.00), SAMAH Dried Fish Processing (P499,580.00), Balognoñan Bread Production (P493,875.00), TALFA Banana, Taro and Cassava Chips Production (P463, 717.00), PROCOFAGCO Coco Shell Briquette (P433,010.00) at DPRA Meat Processing (P424,680.00).

The total amount of funds to be distributed is PHP7,180,965.70. According to the Department of Budget and Management, the government has allocated funding under the General Appropriations Act (GAA) for the DOLE DILP, amounting to P2.352 billion this

year.

Meanwhile, Dr. Azanza also mentioned that the ten organizations assisted by the University are just one of the results of his Padagos Na Patanos Technical Assistance Program for Local Government Units.

"Meron pang 26 na ibang organisasyon sa mga barangay na partner ng CatSU Padagos Na Patanos na nakapila sa next release," the CatSU President concluded.

The Commission on Higher Education - Regional Office V (CHED-RO V) conducted a comprehensive program evaluation at the Catanduanes State University - College of Education (CatSU-COED) on September 25-27, 2024.

The evaluation focused on the Bachelor of Culture and Arts Education (BCAEd) and Bachelor of Physical Education (BPEd) programs, assessing their compliance to the commission's quality standards for A.Y. 2024-2025.

Dr. Rose Marie A. Arao, Education Supervisor II and In-charge for Teacher Education,

and Prof. Lyndon Bailon, member of the CHED Regional Quality Assurance Team (RQAT), led the evaluation. They were joined by CatSU's Quality Assurance Officer, Dr. Edna A. Pante and COEd faculty members, who provided the necessary data and information, and participated in discussions and feedback sessions.

The RQAT ensures the quality of higher education institutions (HEIs) by conducting regular assessments and providing constructive feedback, ensuring that programs meet the standards set for HEIs.

CatSU Task Force for World Rankings convenes for post-evaluation, orientation

The University is gearing up for a bigger and bolder comeback, eyeing a two-peat feat across three World University Rankings.

Following its debut in these prestigious rankings last year and earlier this year, the Task Force, organized and led by the Center for International Relations and Continuing Professional Development Services (CIRCPDS), convened for a Post Evaluation Meeting and Orientation on September 18 at the JD Seminar Hall.

The Task Force, led by CIRCPDS Director Zyra Mae T. Tumala, focused on key indicators where the University performed well and identified areas needing improvement with corresponding evidence. During the meeting, the chairpersons of various indicators presented their post-evaluation reports.

The team is optimistic about elevating last year's global standing of 481st and national rank of 8th in the UI GreenMetric World University Rankings,

highlighting the availability of certain evidence and recent progress in the University's infrastructure and other assessment areas.

The University is strategically planning to submit its data for the upcoming UI rankings in October, while also preparing for the Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Rankings and the World University Rankings for Innovation (WURI), where it earned spots in its debut participation.

In his virtual message from

Congress, CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza expressed confidence that the University will succeed once again in the rankings, emphasizing the tangible improvements made across its fourfold functions. He stressed that this recognition not only brings honor but is also part of the University's broader efforts in internationalization, innovation, and contributing to the global sustainable development goals, with CatSU leading the way.

CatSU receives left-handed armchairs donation from Alpha Phi Omega

The days of left-handed students at Catanduanes State University being left without suitable seating are coming to an end, as this morning, September 18, Alpha Phi Omega (APO) turned over 50 armchairs designed for left-handed students to the university officials.

"Most students are used to right-handed chairs, and we even celebrate Left-Handers Day, we at APO initiated this project to make left-handed students more comfortable and to promote inclusivity. This reflects our commitment to service," shared Engr. Renderizzah Floralde, an APO Zeta Nu member and alumna of CatSU.

Another APO Zeta Nu member and fellow CatSU alumna, Luz R. Jubay, expressed that this donation is a way to give back to the institution, which was the first fraternity to be recognized in the campus. She

also noted that the project aligns with APO's fourfold service: service to the campus, service to the community, service to the chapter, and service to the nation.

Dr. Gemma G. Acedo, Vice President for Academic Affairs, extended her gratitude to the donors. She shared that the chairs will be distributed equally across all colleges, with more chairs expected from APO.

"Thank you for always supporting our university," Dr. Acedo said, joined by Vice President for Administrative and Financial Affairs Engr. Benjamin Hannycel T. Nuyda, Executive Vice President Dr. Roberto B. Barba Jr., and other key officials.

This effort aligns with House Bill No. 8654, passed in 2018, which would mandate that all public and private educational institutions provide appropriate armchairs for left-handed students.

NSTP students, faculty unite for '4 O'clock Habit Dengue Prevention' clean-up drive

their request letter regarding the conduct of the said activities.

"Active engagement and commitment to this habit will be critical in ensuring the health of our school community," they added.

Technology training on charcoal production, briquetting for PROCOFAGCO members held at CatSU

The Skills Training on Charcoal Briquettes Making, an extension initiative by Catanduanes State University (CatSU) in partnership with the Provincial Science & Technology Office - Catanduanes and the DOST-Forest Products Research & Development Institute (FPRDI), aimed to empower local farmers with sustainable livelihood skills.

This training involved 20 members of the Progreso

Coconut Farmers Agriculture Cooperative (PROCOFAGCO) from San Miguel, equipping them with techniques to produce charcoal briquettes from readily available materials like coconut shells, pili nut shells, rice hulls, and bagasse.

CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza emphasized the university's commitment to supporting community livelihoods, remarking, "Kabuhayan ang sagot

sa kahirapan kaya ang CatSU Padagos na Patanos Movement ay tumutulong upang mapalaganap ang livelihood programs sa isla."

He also expressed gratitude to the speakers, including Engr. Amando Allan DM. Bondad, Senior Science Specialist, who shared insights on modern charcoal production technologies.

PROCOFAGCO is one of 56 cooperatives supported by CatSU through the Padagos na

Patanos Extension Services, which seeks to extend the university's technical assistance to communities.

The cooperative received funding of P251,000 through the DOLE Integrated and Livelihood Program (DILP), aiming to create sustainable income-generating activities for local farmers.

The **HERALD** complements the multi-platform communication arm of CCMS Office which utilizes print, radio broadcasting, and social media, as well as the World Wide Web, in the dissemination of the different milestones, programs, projects, activities and achievements of the University, particularly on areas of Instruction, Research, Extension, Production, Governance and Management, and Student Services.

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
