

Placing its name on the world map as Green University: CatSU ranks 8th in PH, 481st worldwide at 2023 UI GreenMetric World University Rankings

Catanduanes State University (CatSU) has made its debut appearance in the UI GreenMetric World University Rankings for 2023, which ranked 481 out of 1183 universities worldwide and took the 8th spot in the Philippines.

With a total score of 6445, CatSU joins 21 other Philippine universities that have made the list, based on the results of UI GreenMetrics released on Tuesday, December 5.

CatSU is the only SUC across the Bicol region that placed in the Top 10.

Taking the top spot in the country is De La Salle University - Dasmarinas with a total score of 7625.

Meanwhile, Wageningen University & Research from the Netherlands, with a total score of 9500, was hailed as the top 1 for this year's UI GreenMetrics World ranking.

All the participating universities across the globe were assessed on six criteria, including setting and infrastructure, energy and climate change, waste, water, transportation, education and research, and with 39 indicators.

The UI GreenMetric World University Ranking is a ranking on

green campus and environmental sustainability initiated by Universitas Indonesia in 2010.

This remarkable achievement of CatSU is a testament to its unwavering commitment to environmental sustainability toward a greener future.



217 CatSU grads pass September 2023 LEPT

Catanduanes State University

has maintained its commendable institutional and first-time taker passing rates for the September 2023 Licensure Examination for Professional Teachers (LEPT) in elementary and secondary levels.

In the elementary level, both Main and Panganiban campuses have delivered a commendable passing rate for first-time takers, with 92.86% and 80.95%, respectively. The main campus' institutional passing rate in elementary is 63.64% and 62. 86% for the Panganiban Campus, against the 47.01% national passing percentage.

For the secondary level, CatSU-Main Campus and Panganiban Campus posted 83.08% and 63.64% passing percentages, respectively, for first-time takers.

The institutional passing rate

for secondary in Main Campus is 62.50%, above the 56.27% national passing rate.

With this, the university has produced 43 new elementary teachers and 174 new secondary teachers.

Based on the results released by the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) on Thursday, December 7, 23,782 elementary teachers out of 50,593 examinees (47.01%) and 53,995 secondary teachers out of 95,969 examinees (56.26%) successfully hurdled the board examination for teachers last September 24, 2023, in 40 testing centers all over the Philippines.

In a bid to hear public perceptions on mining in the island province, the Catanduanes State Universitv (CatSU) organized a public forum on mining, December 11, which was attended by various groups of individuals from different sectors, highlighting the adverse environmental impact of mining and calling for climate justice.

In his remarks, CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza told the attendees that Catandunganons 'must never mortgage' the future.

"Ang buhay kan masunod na henerasyon dae ta dapat isangla ta bako ta an," he strongly declared.

"This resounding 'No to mining from our children, from our future' is heard by no less than those who hold power than those who do not have the power, and I hope those who hold the power should be able to not just listen but put into their hearts that Catanduanes is not for mining," the president added.

Meanwhile, one of the speakers from the Catanduanes Clean and Green Movement urged everyone to demand climate justice in the province.

Serve the people: Dr. Azanza meets and congratulates CatSU's new registered nurses and nutritionist-dietitians

Catanduanes State University's (CatSU) new registered nurses and nutritionist-dietitians from the College of Health Sciences paid a courtesy visit to the university president, Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza, this afternoon, December 5. The universitv produced 126 new nurses, which yielded a 94.03% passing rate in the recent November 2023 Philippine Nurses Licensure Examination.

They were among the 25,761 passers out of 32,203 takers announced by the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC).

Meanwhile, 26 CatSU graduates successfully hurdled the November 2023 Nutritionist-Dietitians Licensure Examination, delivering a 53.06% institutional passing rate.

The Role of Emergency Communication Center: A Perspective from the director and CatSU alumnus

It is a campus facility where critical data passes through, especially during disasters. Now, let us know further how the Catanduanes State University Emergency Communication Services has been serving its purpose, from the words of its director and university's alumnus.

For CICCS Director, Engr. Dexter M. Toyado, the office was re-established to strengthen the support system in communication with the local government and other institutions and designed for disaster risk reduction management.

"Ang CatSU Emergency Communications Services is working under the office of the Center for Island Climate Change Solutions (CICCS). Ngonyan, tig re-establish ta an unit ngani maka-provide nin emergency communication services. Sa communication, it should be the PLGU, LGUs, and the DRRM Offices na dapat na namamayo sa emergency communication, but in times of difficulties, our office is always willing to offer help in any way our equipment can to fill the communication gaps," Engr. Toyado said.

Sharing one of the significant contributions of their office, Engr. Toyado recalled how the 'Go Bag', a portable communication device, facilitated response efforts in the onslaught of Super Typhoon Rolly.

"During those times, just hours after the super typhoon, nasa ere na kami and then nakareport na kami sa Manila about the situation. And a few days after the ST Rolly, an mga gamit uya pinag-setup mi sa sarong mobile pickup, dinara mi sa capitol kaiba ang mga amaturistang radio operators para mag-provide nin additional communication services,"

Recognizing the need for more manpower, the CatSU Ham Radio Society has been established with the support of the University president.

"So CatSU Radio Ham Society, yahalat mi lang so SEC registration para makapaaccredit kami sa NTC as a school-based Amateur Radio group, si President Patrick Alain T. Azanza as a licensed Amateur Radio Operator, siya ang adviser kaan. Ang pinakapurpose kauni ay experimentation, innovation, communication, and of course, service. Sabi ngani sa amateur radio community 'When all else fails, there is amateur radio," Engr. Toyado concluded.

Meanwhile, Engr. Jaimes Edward Barlizo, one of the computer engineering graduates of CatSU who developed a tracking device for fishermen, recognized the importance of the office as it would help the emergency responders communicate effectively and mobilize resources in times of disaster.

"Ang opisinang ito [Emergency Communications Services] ay makakatulong upang lalo pang maunawaan ng mga estudyante kung gaano ka importante ang komunikasyon sa oras ng mga sakuna," he gladly shared.
