emphasized education is a gift, and with every gift comes the responsibility to share it with others."

masters, doctoral graduates, and diploma holders, it is your duty to contribute your knowledge, skills, and expertise, and share these gifts with society," Atty. Jimenez implored.

Encouraging to reflect on the profound responsibility

that lies upon their shoulders, commencement speaker also believed that education is significant to cure the perennial illnesses lingering around our society.

"Illnesses brought are about by ignorance and a lack of critical thinking,' he explained.

He also recognized and wanted to impart to the graduates that 'not everyone has equal access to quality education' which results in inequity in education that perpetuates 'social divides, hampers economic growth, and restricts social mobility."

"It is incumbent upon us to address these disparities and strive for a more inclusive society by contributing our education to improve education opportunities for all," the Pinoy Street Lawyer said, rooted in his own experience as a law practitioner who has been virtually teaching his fellow Filipinos to understand the laws easier through his social media page.

"Let us go forth and bring the change that education can bring to society," Atty. Jimenez urged the graduates to take part.

CONFERMENT OF DEGREES

On that day, there were 42 graduates nodding to the words of the speaker who were conferred with their respective advanced higher education degrees.

Only two of whom were granted a Doctor of Philosophy in Educational Management for this Academic Year 2022-2023.

Among the master's degrees, the Master of Arts Educational Management program has the highest number of graduates for this commencement rites; 12 were conferred.

It was followed by the Master of Arts in Teaching Biology with six (6) graduates,

and then four graduates from the Master of Arts in Industrial Education, Master of Arts in Filipino Education, Master of Arts in English, and Master in Business Administration, respectively.

In terms of the least number of graduates in advanced higher education level, only one conferred with the Master of Arts in Agricultural Education and the Master of Public Administration, followed by the Master of Arts in Teaching Chemistry and the Master of Arts in Mathematics Education with two graduates. And only one made it to claim the Diploma in Public Administration.

LEARNING THE ULTIMATE LESSON

Before the investiture of hood and cap took place, President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza introduced and described the graduation speaker as 'an advocate, an educator, and a beacon of hope for justice' and a 'man who dedicated his life to making the law accessible to all.'

In his remarks, he shared with the newly minted master's and doctorate degree holders the ultimate lesson by sharing the result of a longitudinal study conducted by Harvard University that revolved around monitoring the success of 725 participants.

"The result showed that it is not physical fitness, it is not financial wealth, or even academic or accomplishments, the accolades, or the awards you gather in life, but rather what is more important is social fitness or positive relationships; having positive relationships makes one feel successful and happy," Dr. Azanza justified.

CatSU hosts Capacity Building on University Research Futures Thinking and Foresight

Catanduanes State University

(CatSU) collaborated with Camarines Norte State College and Central Bicol State University of Agriculture to organize a comprehensive Capacity Building program on University Research Futures Thinking and Foresight. This initiative aimed to enhance the skills of State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) in adopting a futures thinking and strategic foresight approach to planning, aligning with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The program consisted of three phases:

Phase 1 (June 14-16) focused on Foresight-Insight-Action, utilizing lectures, video presentations, and facilitated workshops.

Phase 2 (June 19-30) involved field research related to identified commodities.

Phase 3 (July 12-14) included scenario and strategy development, covering environmental scanning, strategy development, backcasting, and moonshots.

The training was hosted by CatSU in partnership with Aptissimi Development Innovations, Inc. (ADII) and

the Philippine Futures Thinking Society. The goal was to democratize futures thinking through education, research, training, and advocacy.

During the program, participating universities identified various commodities for futures thinking research, such as smoked fish, seaweeds, and pineapple. Distinguished guests and lecturers, including

experts in futures thinking, provided valuable insights and guidance.

The Presidents of CatSU, CBSUA, and CNSC expressed their gratitude to Sen. Pia Cayetano for providing this opportunity to capacitate their universities in futures thinking and foresight. They emphasized the importance of these skills in sparking innovation, managing

change, and facilitating social transformation.

Overall, the program aimed to prepare Philippine HEIs for an increasingly complex and uncertain future, ensuring they contribute effectively to the SDGs and address societal challenges through forward-thinking approaches.

the growth of the positive political sphere among Catandunganon Youth and the No To Vote Buying Campaigns.

SKale UP! 2023 is organized by Young Catanduanes Leaders Institute and Catanduanes Knowledge Pantry in cooperation with Political Science Society, CatSU Central Women's Circle and CatSU College of Health Sciences College Student Council.

In addition to the training program, the Catanduanes Knowledge Pantry has requested

CatSU's partnership in an research ongoing project "Civic Engagement, titled Political & CSOs Participation, and Needs Analysis of Catandunganon Youth." CatSU graduation rites pushes; Dr. Azanza tells grads to 'look beyond the cloudy skies'

An hour before the 1,515 graduates of Cluster B marched, a heavy downpour pelted their caps and gowns while they were heading to Catanduanes State University (CatSU) Front Grounds to celebrate the 52nd Commencement Exercises on Tuesday afternoon, July 11, 2023.

Despite the threat of the gloomy weather and drizzles at the start of the program, the graduates did not deter, and the university pushed through with the much-awaited celebration of the year.

the event's Associating situation with limitations on conquering life, CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza urged the graduates to 'look beyond'.

"These (cloudy skies and heavy rains) are all limitations to make sure that you conform to the norms of life. Outside these limitations are unlimited potentials," the president said.

"By looking beyond, you will be more, you will grow," he assured the graduates.

Meanwhile. commencement speaker also acknowledged the limitations confronted challenges by the Class of 2023 through his representative, Dr. Maria Christina F. Campita, DA-RFOV Supervising Agriculturist, praising the graduates as "it was not an easy journey" and "not for the weak-hearted"

"As graduates of this institution, you have a significant role to fill in and rise above these challenges," Department of Agriculture - Regional Field Office V (DAROV) Director Rodel P. Tornilla said.

As a certified farmer and a Catandunganon himself, the DA regional director recognized the resilient character of the Catandunganon people and challenged the newly minted graduates to emulate this on their first job.

Present certificate of indigency if no medical tests during enrollment, Dr. Azanza tells CatSU incoming students on pre-enrollment orientation

Attended by hundreds of students from five colleges, Catanduanes State University President, Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza told the incoming first year, transferees, and returning students to submit their certificate of indigency in the absence of medical tests during the Pre-enrollment Orientation on Monday, July 31.

"Do not worry, magpresent sana kamong certificate of indigency sa medical officer, libre man an na makukuha sa mga barangay. No one should be refused to enroll dahil daeng imo para magpa-medical buda laboratory tests," the president assured the students at the university gymnasium.

"Gigibuhan ta an ning paagi, later on, kung papano kamo makacomply sa mga requirement," the president added.

In response to the president's pronouncement, students, including the faculty from the College of Agriculture and Fisheries, College of Business and Accountancy, College of Education, College of Health Science, and College of Engineering and Architecture, cheered and gave a round of applause.

Echoing the directive of the president, the university registrar, Ms. Marilyn G. Tejada, reiterated to the students the importance of securing the above-cited certificate and advised them to countercheck their Certificate of Enrollment (COE) upon issuance with their prospectus to avoid conflicts.

"Provide a certificate of indigency before proceeding to your respective deans' offices and compare your COEs to your prospectus," Tejada stated while discussing the topic about the policies on admission, registration, evaluation, and grading systems.

Meanwhile, Office of Student Affairs and Development Services (OSADS) newly-

designated Director Prof. Francis John B. Templonuevo, informed the incoming students about their office's mandate and urged them to participate in the university's co-curricular programs and activities.

"Partner tayo, if may concern kayo, bukas ang aming opisina para riyan. Kami rin ang in-charge sa pag-monitor at guide sa mga students' activities," the OSADS director said.

Introducing University Student Council (USC) President Francine Mae T. Tayo to present the new design of the proposed student uniform, Prof. Templonuevo urged the incoming CatSUans to practice wearing their school uniform since this is a 'form of discipline and will serve as their identities' as students of CatSU.

August 1, Cluster B students and faculty will attend similar orientations from four colleges: the College of Information and Communications Technology, College of Industrial Technology, College of Humanities and Social Sciences, and the College of Science.

With a rating of 85.70%, Engr. Gonzales, 25, presently working as a structural engineer since 2021 in a private construction firm in Quezon City, bested 5,107 other examinees and made it to the list of topnotchers as announced by the Professional Regulation Commission on July 19, 2023.

Engr. Gonzales has been consistent achiever even during her elementary days, as she emerged as their class valedictorian and graduated

later on under the Science and Technology Oriented Class (STOC) in high school.

her During years in college, she became a representative of the university in various engineering competitions and eventually graduated Cum Laude with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering.

After graduating in 2019, she took and passed the November licensure examination for civil engineers with a remarkable rating of 89.35%, falling short of only two points to the Top 10 spot at the National level.

Serving as an accessible and strategic venue, Catanduanes State University (CatSU), through its auditorium, accommodated for free over 2,000 Catandunganons who availed the three-day mobile services of the Professional Regulation Commission Region V (PRC V), sponsored by the Office of Congressman Eulogio 'Leo' Rodriguez.

Extending his gratitude Congressman Rodriguez, CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza expressed that the outreach program of PRC, through the initiative of the lawmaker, benefitted the Catandunganons, saving them both time and travel expenses.

least 2,566 transactions were processed and finished through the PRC's mobile services.

Among these services offered, the highest number of recorded transactions three days of the said activity, is the authentication of certificates, with a total of 1.014.

Followed by certification with a total of 911 recorded transactions, while 247 newly registered Catandunganon professionals applied for the initial registration.

Meanwhile, a total of 204 transactions were recorded in the renewal of professional identification cards: aspiring professionals filed their applications; and 42 applied for changes of entries and status.

Before the start of the application, the applicants were advised by the PRC V 'to register online at https://prc.gov.ph to secure an appointment before proceeding to the mobile service venue'.

Pro-student, Pro-people: Dr. Azanza addresses enrollment concerns, unveils innovative initiative for CatSU, Catandunganon

In a significant display of prostudent leadership, Catanduanes State University's President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza takes proactive measures to address enrollment requirements while unveiling transformative initiatives for the institution.

Proactive response to enrollment requirements Concern

President Azanza, during an interview on Radyo Pilipinas Catanduanes, took a proactive stance in addressing a minor concern about enrollment requirements from -concerned students who cannot afford the medical laboratory costs such as the CBC, chest x-ray, and Drug Test. However, the President's swift response demonstrated the university's commitment to caring for its students.

The university adheres to the guidelines set forth by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED). Similar policies are also followed by other reputable institutions like Bicol University the University of the Nevertheless, Dr. Azanza empathized with financially disadvantaged students and vowed to find a solution that would not hinder their enrolment.

He stressed that no student should be turned away due to financial constraints, and all students will be allowed to enroll regardless of whether they've completed the medical requirements. "Those students who cannot afford the required tests but can present a Certificate of Indigency will not be denied President enrolment," the assured the students.

Dr. Azanza also emphasized that students who test positive for any condition will be protected under the Data Privacy Act, and appropriate interventions will be provided to support their wellbeing.

"We will protect the privacy the students. Kung may intervention na gigibuhon, we will help. Dai tabi sinda irerefuse sa enrolment; ang slot nya saiya po iyan. May mga apprehension ang mga magurang, nasasabutan ta po iyan. Never refuse them in their enrolment.

While some may perceive these measures as anti-poor, Dr. Azanza emphasized that his motivations lie in supporting the students and ensuring a fair and accessible educational experience for all. He takes pride in his role as a pro-student leader, as evidenced by the distribution of one thousand tablets to students during online classes in the midst of the pandemic.

The President welcomes acknowledging that they play a vital role in driving positive changes for the betterment of government service and the university as a whole.


Expanding medical services is especially significant for CatSU, which recently has opened a Master of Arts in Nursing program and



SOWING THE SEEDS OF HOPE:

SR. DULAI'S CALLING TO HER **INCREDIBLE SUCCESS AS AN OUTSTANDING WOMAN ENTREPRENEUR**

In this age where people desire instant gratification, planting may seem unbearable and tiresome with its waiting process. It sometimes becomes disheartening not to see swift results as we wait for the seeds to grow into fruition.

However, for Sr. Teodula Forones, fondly called by many as 'Sr. Dulai', an alumna of Catanduanes State University (CatSU), planting is a demonstration of one's faith, a chance to create opportunities, and an act of giving hope.

Through her strong faith and hard work, the opportunity blossomed at the perfect time after her debut on the national scene, clinching the Top 4 for this year's Search for Outstanding Women Entrepreneurs: National Innovation Challenge spearheaded by the Department of Science and Technology (DOST)

Her incredible feat is rooted in the 'golden' spice called turmeric. Its wonders not only provide health and medicinal benefits but also empower people's lives, like Sr. Dulai.

Currently serving as the School Principal of Mother Crucifix Caputo Academy, Inc. (MCCA), Sr. Dulai kickstarted turmeric planting to support the daily operation of the school and to continue the school's mission of providing educational opportunities for belonging to underprivileged families.

Since the school merely relies on donations and assistance from several benefactors.

To make the most of the turmeric plants, she started formulating turmeric tea to provide free books to the students. The initiative grew, and soon enough, Sr. Dulai opened Caputo's farm to give employment opportunities to the parents. The farm also paid for the tuition of the children of the mother-workers.

This innovative and altruistic program by Sr. Dulai and the MCCA earned the support of DOST, which equipped them with more machines for turmeric tea formulation and a hand tractor for the farm.

With the success of the farm work operations, DOST invited Sr. Dulai to participate in the UNLAD BAYI Search for Innovative Women in the regions where she landed in the Top 3 spot. In addition to the P50,000 prize money, Sr. Dulai represented Region VIII in the national

competition.

She later conquered the national competition and received P100,000 in addition to the machine and equipment grants to continue the farm operations and provide more opportunities to the students and their parents.

The search is part of the WomenHelping-Women: Innovating Social Enterprise (WHWise) Program of DOST, which aims to provide women with opportunities to showcase innovative their business ideas through an inclusive startup ecosystem.

However, similar to the planting process, Sr. Dulai's feat did not immediately flourish. It was a from Pangangan, Calape, Bohol, Sr. Dulai endured her longing for her home as she decided to pursue a Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education major in General Science at then Catanduanes State Colleges in 1992. While pursuing the noblest profession, she also entered the

Congregation of the Sisters of St. John the Baptist.

When her graduation was nearing, her life was full of doubt and confusion. As if she was a seed buried under the soil, she found herself lost in the darkness. Sr. Dulai almost gave up her vocation.

"A month before graduation, I was in crisis. I told my critic teacher, Mrs. Sonia Vargas-Sapeco about [my] plan of giving up my vocation. [However], she asked me if I prayed for my decision. Her question

After some time, she returned to her roots in the island province of Catanduanes to serve

as the Principal of Ville St. John School Virac from 2012-2017.

When she was transferred to Biliran, Sr. Dulai took on the challenge of establishing a junior and senior high school under the congregation of MCCA to give children from remote areas a chance to enter high school. The school, which she established with the help of its benefactors and other stakeholders, is now the home of Caputo's Farm.

What was once an initiative to support the school's daily operation is now a project with 54 scholars, 180 students with free books, 30 parents as association members, and 32 microbusiness partners for the Caputo farm

products.

As she continued with her selfless and genuine love for her work, she was able to plant seeds of hope in the hearts of the children at MCCA.

Despite the years it took and the gloominess she had to endure on her journey, Sr. Dulai remained faithful to the Lord and to her profession as a teacher. Like seeds, the darkness in our lives is sometimes God's way of letting us grow.

Her story reminds us that the value of waiting is not always found at the end of the process but in the process itself and in the hope that allows us to keep waiting.







FOR 25-YEAR-OLD Engr. Divina V. Gonzales, acing the 6th spot in the Master Plumbers Licensure Examination (MPLE) was not easy, defying all odds to achieve greatness as a full-time structural engineer while selfreviewing for the board examination.

But through her hard work and perseverance, the cum laude

civil engineering graduate of the Catanduanes State University turned the impossible into possible after the results of the July 2023 MPLE unfolded, and was still in utter disbelief.

Raised in Hawan Grande, in the capital town of Virac, this young achiever attained a rating of 85.70 percent and bested 5,107 other examinees across the country.

MAPPING OUT OPPORTUNITIES

During her five years stay at CatSU after graduation in 2019, the native Viracnon not only excelled in academics but also in off-campus competitions, learning to always enter a door of opportunities.

"As CatSU student, you have to make the most out of every opportunity na binibigay sayo. Ilang beses din ako nabigyan ng chance para i-represent ang CatSU sa iba't ibang contest, at dahil dito na-invite ako ng isang review center upang bigyan ng free review for civil engineering board exam kasama na lodging," she recounted.

One of the contests she joined with flying colors was the 37th National Civil Engineering Students Quiz as a grand finalist, after notching first place at the regional level.

Her achievement did not end after graduation, falling short of only two points to the Top 10 spot at the National level, she attained an incredible rating of 89.35% during the November licensure examination for civil engineers.

SETTING WISE CUES

Imparting advice to fellow CatSUans to pass and even top the board exam, Engr. Gonzales

CHARTERING A DIFFERENT PATH

Unlike many aspiring master plumbers who join review centers, Engr. Gonzales decided to take a different route. With her full-time job, she undertook a selfreview journey.

"Pagkatapos ng office hours, pagod na physically at mentally, 'di na po ako nakaka-review nang maayos. Wala rin akong maayos na space para magreview dahil may mga kasama po ako sa staffhouse at lights off na usually ng 10-11 p.m., kaya nagbabasa na lang po ako ng reviewer sa phone," she shared.

But drawing inspiration from her parents' struggle in raising five children, the daughter of a surveyor and a housewife persisted in achieving her ultimate goal.

"Nakita ko 'yong hirap nila para makapag-aral kaming magkakapatid. Gusto ko lang po shared some important tips to follow: study routine, possess self-discipline, take care of one's health, focus, and avoid distractions.

"Be consistent and make studying a habit. Kailangan sanayin ang sarili sa pagsagot ng exams sa reviewers para pagdating ng actual na board exam 'di ka na mabibigla at medyo confident ka nang sumagot," Gonzales stated.

"Gumawa ka ng sarili mong schedule at magbigay ng extra effort para masundan ito. Make studying easier. Hindi mo kailangang kabisaduhin lahat ng nasa reviewer word by word. Puwede kang gumawa ng patterns and mnemonics, or i-relate mo sa ibang bagay 'yong inaaral mo," she added.

Also, the master plumber topnotcher advised the takers to avoid distractions and always set priorities.

"Magpahinga rin nang tama sa oras at alagaan ang katawan. Balewala lahat ng aral mo kung magkakasakit ka sa mismong araw ng exam," Engr. Gonzales added.

With her unwavering spirit, Engr. Gonzales has proven that she is not just a master plumber but a master of life's extraordinary journey.

She has now etched her name in the records of CatSU's historical feats and serves as a beacon of hope for aspiring engineers, especially for young women, for taking the uncharted path and now standing with pride in the middle of a less traveled road.
