CatSU LEPT topnotcher dedicates feat to his 'first teacher', his late mother

Though often associated with bad luck, for Kharlos Miguel T. Bautista, Friday the 13th last December 2024 was his lucky day. It was the day the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) announced he ranked 8th among 48,875 passers in the secondary level of the Licensure Examination for Professional Teachers (LEPT).

"It feels surreal that I am finally one with my dreams"

Bautista said during his speech at EduKahusayan event on December 22, 2024, recalling how he celebrated the news with his father and siblings — crying and jumping together.

With a 93.00% rating, the Catanduanes State University (CatSU) cum laude graduate dedicated his success to his "first teacher," his late mother, who taught him to read and write. "She's always been there for my wins and losses," he said, admitting to himself that he was not a 'hundred percent happy' despite his achievement knowing that her mother is not physically present to celebrate with him.

However, he believed that his mother was proudly looking down on him at that moment not just for passing but for topping the board exam—and for fulfilling their long-held dream of him becoming a teacher, a goal he had cherished since childhood.

A valedictorian at Gogon Elementary School and a Science, Technology, and Engineering (STE) program graduate of Catanduanes National High School, Bautista earned his degree in secondary education major in Science at CatSU as a DOST scholar.



CatSU Nursing Exam Topnotcher: Anything is possible if you put your mind into it

"I always tell myself that it's either I top this exam or I fail it. There's no in-between. This achievement has taught me that anything is possible if you put your mind into it," shared Mikael Angelo Rabino Romero, Catanduanes State University's (CatSU) lone topnotcher, who secured the 10th spot in the November 2024 Philippine Nurses Licensure Examination.

With a rating of 90.60%, the Viracnon topnotcher shared the challenges he faced during his preparation, including unexpected hurdles that tested his resilience.

"One unexpected challenge was when our review center shifted to online classes due to flooding in Quezon City. When it happened, I relied on the study habits I developed during the COVID-19 lockdown. I paced my studies and ensured I had enough time for myself," Romero explained.


The CatSU grad topnotcher completed his elementary education at Virac Pilot Elementary School and graduated from Catanduanes National High School. His father hails from Virac, while his mother is from Batangas.

When asked about his motivation for pursuing a career in nursing, the son of engineer parents emphasized his sense of duty to the people around him. He credited the influence and support of his family and community for helping him overcome daily challenges.

Looking ahead, Romero plans to pursue medical school. In the meantime, he is dedicating himself to bedside care and teaching.

As he aspires to become a doctor, he lives by his guiding principle: "Take one step at a time. Failure is the end only if you stop trying."

Romero is one of the 29,349 passers out of 34,534 examinees in the November 2024 board exam, where the University achieved an outstanding 96.32% passing rate for first-time takers and a 92.36% overall performance rating, surpassing the national passing rate of 84.99%.

Atty. Recognizing the realities of teaching, Atty. de la Cruz reminded the new educators that their profession goes beyond material rewards or comfort. He further highlighted the contributions of the university's Paggiya seminar series in equipping examinees with the tools to excel.

A centerpiece of the event was the inspirational address by Mr. Kharlos Miguel T. Bautista, who placed 8th nationwide with an impressive 93.00% rating. Bautista's speech with resonated deeply the audience as he candidly shared his struggles with self-doubt and anxiety, recounting how he persevered to achieve a dream nurtured since childhood. "To my fellow passers, let us embrace the privilege of shaping young minds. As educators, we are entrusted with the responsibility to ignite curiosity and instill values," he urged. HONORING 2024 LEPT PASSERS. To recognize the commendable passing rate of the passers of the September 2024 Licensure Examination for Professional Teachers (LEPT), the Catanduanes State University College of Education conducted the Edukahusayan event in December 2022.

Despite challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, he excelled in both distance and face-toface learning for four years as a consistent dean's list.

At the start, Bautista did not aim to top the board exam. However, after losing in a national quiz competition organized by Carl Balita Review Center, he vowed to redeem himself.

"Babawi ako sa board exam, magkikita-kita kami ulit, doon ang tunay na <u>laban,"</u> he expressed.

Secretly setting his sights on the top to avoid external pressure, he intensified his preparation, including daily drills, flashcards, and studying late at night.

A pre-board exam ranking of 3rd in the Bicol region and inspiration from a friend who ranked 10th in the nursing board exam further fueled his aspiration to top the board exam.

Sharing tips during review, the topnotcher said that 'distractions' had no place, describing his focused routine of reviewing complex concepts in physics and professional education.

"No distractions during review, nakatago ang cellphone sa drawer, nakaharap sa reviewer and laptop. Minsan inaabot ng 2AM sa pag-review especially sa majorship, mahihirap na concepts, and problem solving sa physics," Bautista explained, allocating more time in Professional Education and Majorship, since both equally contributed 80% in the overall rating.

His disciplined approach paid off, but he emphasized that success isn't just about recognition.

For Bautista, being a topnotcher is not just about recognition, rewards, and incentives: this is God's way to inspire and help more people, to serve our countrymen, to teach the students, to shape young minds, and to inspire them to dream and help them to reach their utmost potential.

For those aspiring to become topnotcher, his message was 'dreaming big is the first step, but dedication, perseverance, and faith will take you further that you can't imagine'

"The journey won't be easy, sleepless nights, breakdowns, and doubts. Believe in your capabilities. You want to pass the board exam? Exert efforts, and be consistent. You want to top the board exam? Double your efforts, and be consistent," he shared.

Bautista expressed gratitude to CatSU for fostering a supportive learning environment and thanked his family, comparing their influence to a beautiful melody in his life. In fact, CatSU produced 274 passers in the September 2024 LEPT, including 64 in elementary education and 210 in secondary education, continuing its tradition of surpassing the national average.

"Keep your eyes on the stars and your feet on the ground," he advised, urging aspiring educators to balance effort with rest and trust in God's timing.







CHUMSS ACOs project earns international recognition from WURI for upholding global resilience

WURI is one of three Commission on Higher Education's (CHED) recognized ranking systems for higher education institution internationalization, such as the Quacquarelli Symonds (QS World, Asia, and Stars), and Times Higher Education (THE World, Asia, and Impact Rankings).


evaluates and ranks lt ton universities around the world for the institution's real contributions to industry and society.

Launched in September 2023, the CHUMSS: ACOs Project reflects the university's drive to community development and sustainable livelihoods.

According to CHUMSS faculty member, Ricardo Arcilla Jr., who is also the brainchild of the project, the program supported four ACOs, benefiting 106 members through training and resources to promote self-sufficiency.

The college also partnered with TESDA-CSHCI and the Local Government Unit of Bagamanoc to strengthen the project's impact.

CHUMSS ACOs focuses on five key components. First is Capacity Building, equipping ACO members with essential skills in organizational management, financial literacy, and leadership. The second one is Technical Skills Development, where the members receive specialized training in food production and service industries.



Another one is Team Building and Leadership Training. This aspect strengthens community cohesion and develops leadership skills through collaborative activities and training sessions.

The last component is ACOs Community Outreach, addressing both immediate and long-term recovery needs in times of disasters

On December 4, CHUMSS faculty and students organized an outreach activity to help their adopted organizations recover from the Super Typhoon Pepito's devastating effects, distributing generator sets funded by CHUMSS faculty and sacks of rice provided by the Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office (PSWDO).

To guide the efforts and ensure the continued success of the university in research and extension, the Office of the Vice President for Research, Extension, and Production Affairs (OVPREPA), led by Dr. Rosana S. Abundo, organized a threeday Research, Development, and Extension (RD&E) Planning Workshop and Stakeholders' Forum for Calendar Year 2025 on December 12-14, 2024.
