With flickering hope and enthusiasm, hundreds of preservice teachers marched together with their parents and guardians on Wednesday, January 31, to celebrate their 5th Pinning and Torch Lighting Ceremony, marking the start of their teaching internship journey.

With the theme "Seedbed of Globally Competitive Future Educators," College of Education (COEd) Dean Dr. Maria Sheila R. Gregorio, applauded the dedication and perseverance of the pre-service teachers, including their parents, for reaching this milestone.

"I am grateful that you have chosen to be our next generation of teachers because those seven semesters are no joke. You persevered to withstand the weakening of academics despite the [many] adversities and difficulties in this competitive education, and you made it this far with your parents," she exclaimed.

"To our pre-service teachers, continue to grow, learn, and lead. You are not just the future; you are the present, making a difference today that will reverberate across generations," Dr. Gregorio concluded.

Unfolding the reality in the teaching profession, Catanduanes State University (CatSU) President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza expressed that the teaching profession requires 'sacrifice' as difficulties coexisted in the profession.

"Minsan malakaw kamo sa baha, minsan may bagyo, maamay na mamata, all the sacrifices, even stories of teachers crossing rivers and climbing mountains whenever they are assigned to far-flung areas just to deliver the services to our children," he told the future educators as they convened inside the university gymnasium.

### 2 CatSU faculty chosen as PH delegates for World Youth Festival 2024 in Russia

**College of Humanities and** Social Sciences (CHUMSS) faculty Mr. Santos G. Sorra Jr. and College of Business and Accountancy (CBA) faculty Mr. John Edmund P. Manlagnit were selected to attend the World Youth Festival (WYF) 2024 on March 1-7, 2024 at Sirius Federal Territory, Russia.

Both faculty members from Catanduanes State University (CatSU) are designated College Coordinators of the Center for International Relations and Continuing Professional Development Services (CIRCPDS), and they will also be representing the University's internationalization efforts during said event.

Selected among the 20,000 from over 309 thousand applications from 188 countries, Sorra and Manlagnit expressed their optimism regarding the event's potential key takeaways, emphasizing their motivation to actively participate in discussions.

When asked about their expectations from their involvement in the festival and how they intend to utilize the insights gained, Sorra highlighted the significance of establishing networks with fellow youth from various countries and organizations.

"We hope to establish networks with like-minded youths representing their countries, organization, and universities. This will provide a stepping stone for the university towards our aim for internationalization," Sorra stated.

Similarly, Manlagnit drew upon his past experiences in international conferences to underline the importance of such platforms in addressing global challenges.

"My attendance to several international youth fora in Russia and Egypt shed some light to help solve some of the pressing issues here in the Philippines, particularly in Catanduanes. These platforms help me become adept with how youth can present innovative solutions to societal problems," Manlagnit explained.

The two faculty members were also selected to participate in the Youth Regional Program scheduled for March 10 - 17, hosted by the same country. They have successfully advanced through qualification processes and secured spots among the 2

Azanza, toward youth development and promoting international cooperation.

### CatSU seminar explores climate change interconnection: Insights from Balik-Scientist Awardee Dr. Deborah Tangunan

**Catanduanes State University** (CatSU) was the center of knowledge exchange and collaboration as it hosted a seminar on "Climate, Humans, and the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change" on February 6 at the CatSU auditorium.

Spearheaded by the CatSU

Center for Island Climate Change Solutions (CICCS) and its Director Engr. Dexter M. Toyado, in coordination with Balik-Scientist Awardee, Dr. Deborah N. Tangunan, the event drew significant interest from over 500 students and faculty of the university, representing the College of Science, College of Agriculture and Fisheries, and College of Engineering and Architecture.

The seminar aimed to shed light on the intricate relationship between climate change and human activities, with a focus on the findings and recommendations of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC).

Dr. Tangunan, a distinguished recipient of the Balik-Scientist Award from the Department of Science and Technology (DOST), served as the keynote speaker, see page 12

### Abaca breakthroughs in Catanduanes CatSU, DOST-NRCP lead 5-day seminar-workshop initiative for abaca niche centers

The Catanduanes State Technology University-Abaca Innovation Center (ATIC), in collaboration with CatSU Research and Development Services (RDS), partners with DOST-National Research Council of the Philippines (RD Lead Fire Project) and the Philippine Fiber Industry Development Authority for a 5-day Seminar-Workshop, focusing on crafting proposals for Abaca Niche Centers in the region (NICER) and hands-on technology transfer for abaca good agricultural practices.

Over 70 student-researchers and faculty members from the Main and Panganiban campuses of CatSU joined and gained insights during the first day of their seminar-workshop, February 5 at the E-Crown Hotel and Resort.

With the theme "Sustainable and Continuous RD & E Activities and Technologies for a Resilient Future of the Abaca Industry" Vice President for Research, Extension, and Production Affairs (VP-REPA) Dr. Rosana S. Abundo extended her gratitude to DOST-NRCP for granting and approving the request of CatSU to become one of their host institutions.

"We need more collaborations, assistance, and expertise from other agencies to provide us inputs in strengthening our research capabilities," the Vice President said.

Emphasizing the crucial role of research and sciences, CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza stressed that understanding how things work is crucial.

"In everything we undertake, research holds great importance. Science is equally crucial as it guides us in making advancements," said the President, who values the abaca industry of the island from the grassroots, further emphasizing the importance of research and the role of science in reaching out to the grassroots.

Meanwhile, the Executive Director of the National Research Council of the Philippines, Dr. Bernardo N. Sepeda shared his insights about the unique varieties of Abaca in the Bicol region.

"Isa sa pinakamagandang biyaya ng maykapal sa Bicol ay ang Abaca dahil marami tayong variety ng Abaca na dito lamang tumutubo, dito lang yumayabong nang sagana at maganda," he explained.

Present also in the activity were NRCP Project Senior Technical Specialist Mr. Marfy H. Lita, together with Ms. Rizza L. Canon and Ms. Maradika Y. Ramos, Provincial DOST Director Gram Molina, Provincial Fiber Officer Mr. Roberto B. Lusuegro, Provincial Administrator Eulalia Talaran, as well as other CatSU officials.

In the afternoon session, Career Scientist and RD Leader Dr. Leny C. Galvez concluded the first-day seminar workshop with an understanding of the

DICT official, Christopher

Turado, who served as the resource speaker, implored the students to actively practice cyber security measures to avert cybercrimes, data breaches, identity theft, and other malicious activities.

"Data is the most expensive commodity, and cybersecurity is everybody's responsibility," he said.

Emphasizing the dual nature of cyberspace, CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza gave the students concrete examples of how cyberspace provides satisfaction and destruction to humans.

He recounted how 'Zagana', an online application, helped his friend to deliver fresh produce during the pandemic,

### Additional to many 'firsts': Infirmary set to open soon at CatSU

In addition to the university's many firsts for the past three Catanduanes State vears. University (CatSU) has unveiled its plan to open an infirmary inside the campus, marking a significant milestone in CatSU's commitment to providing quality healthcare services to its students, faculty, and staff. The said plan was announced by CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza on social media his page on February 6. who highlighted the importance of the infirmary in enhancing the overall well-being and safety of the university community. Based on the floor plan provided by Planning Development Services, the facility has a capacity

beds in total: five (5) beds inside a ward/labor room, two (2) beds in the delivery room, another two (2) beds in the recovery room, one (1) bed intended for the dental clinic, one (1) bed in the medical/ consultation room, two (2) beds in the treatment area, and one (1) bed in the wound dressing area.

"Saro na namang proyekto ini para sa pag-alaga nin kalusugan kan mga taga-CatSU," the president said.

Dr. Azanza underscored that the establishment of the health facility is in line with CatSU's mission to prioritize the health and welfare of its constituents.

The infirmary project is seen as a complementary initiative to the recently approved mobile clinic by the Board of Regents.

In this strategic move, CatSU plans to broaden the range of healthcare services and ensure all members of the community have access to medical assistance.

Located behind the university hostel as part of the Health Sciences complex, the new health facility will house the Medical and Dental Services, which is set to be relocated from the university main building.

In unveiling the infirmary plans, CatSU lays the foundation for the future expansion of its academic program.

According to Dr. Azanza, the establishment of the infirmary is a significant milestone in the university's endeavor to open a College of Medicine.

With this remarkable effort, CatSU demonstrates its commitment to advancing healthcare education and training future generations of healthcare professionals.

### CatSU distributes P27k educational grant to 103 ACEF-GIAHEP grantees at Panganiban Campus

**On Monday, February 19,** the Catanduanes State University released a financial subsidy to 103 students of Panganiban campus amounting to P27,000 each for two semesters under the Agricultural Competitiveness Enhancement Fund-Grants-In-Aid for Higher Education Program (ACEF-GIAHEP).

For fourth-year agriculture student, James Fernandez, the educational assistance would be a great aid for his preparation for the upcoming licensure examination after graduation.

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sharing her expertise and insights on the subject matter.

In her talk, Dr. Tangunan emphasized the impact of climate change on human life, citing examples such as increased flooding and the necessity for agricultural adaptations during planting and harvesting seasons, and also discussion on the Earth's climate, its current trajectory, and the potential implications for future generations, pinning on the urgency of addressing climate-related challenges.

Meanwhile, on the topic "Climate and Marine Biodiversity", College of Science faculty, Mr. Aljon Francis Koji P. Elegado, discussed how climate change affects marine life and ecosystems. He also shared how marine ecosystems offer solutions and processes to adapt to climate change.

Expressing his gratitude, CatSU President Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza thanked Dr. Tangunan for selecting CatSU as the host institution for her tenure in Catanduanes. He then articulated the university's aspiration to be recognized in the World University Rankings, emphasizing the importance of collaborations such as this to achieve that goal.
