HISTORICAL PROFILE

The Catanduanes State University (CatSU), formerly Catanduanes State Colleges (CSC), has evolved as the only premier Public Higher Education Institution in the province of Catanduanes since the enactment of Republic Act 3398 which called for the establishment of Virac National Agricultural Trade School (VNATS); until a decade later, when then Catanduanes Congressman Jose M. Alberto authored Republic Act 6341 which converted VNATS into Catanduanes State Colleges (CSC) on June 19, 1971. The ultimate dream of every Catandunganon was to have a university in the island. Congressman Alberto started to work on the fulfilment of that dream but prevailing economic and political climate at that time prevented him and he had to settle for the creation of the CSC instead.

The academic institution has two campuses within the island-province of Catanduanes. The main campus is located at Calatagan Proper in the capital town of Virac; and the other campus, the CatSU-Panganiban Campus (formerly CAIC), is located in the northern municipality of Panganiban in Catanduanes. The institution is categorized as SUC-Level III-A. It is now considered as a comprehensive Higher Education Institution in Catanduanes, and acknowledged as one of the dynamic SUCs in the Bicol region offering a wide range of academic programs.

The school started functioning as a tertiary educational institution on December 1, 1971. It initially offered courses such as Associate in Business Education, Associate in Commerce, Bachelor of Science in Education, Master of Arts in Education, and Master of Arts in Commerce. Additional courses were offered on July 8, 1972 by virtue of RA 6590. On July 22, 1996, the Tenth Congress of the Republic of the Philippines enacted and approved Republic Act No. 8292 which provided for the uniform composition and powers of the governing board, the manner of appointment and the term of office of the President of chartered state universities and colleges, and for other purposes.

On October 31, 1999, the Catanduanes Agricultural and Industrial College (CAIC) in Panganiban, Catanduanes, was integrated to the CSC. The move was in conformity with the Special Provision No. 2 of the Commission on Higher Education

(CHED) FY 1999 Budget under the General Appropriations Act of 1999. In 1993, CAIC was renamed as CSC Panganiban Campus as an offshoot of the approved Revised Organizational Structure per Board Resolution No. 15, s. 2003.

Not forgetting about the dream of every Catandunganon, the journey of the institution towards its conversion into a University was started, this time in the halls of the academe itself, under the visionary administration of CSC President Dr. Rodolfo V. Azanza (1986-1990) when the saga of the institution's internationalization initiatives and faculty scholarships abroad were dynamically initiated. The culture of research and publication was likewise established along with the strengthening of the graduate school during Dr. Rodolfo V. Azanza's term. These initiatives were followed through by President Adolfo S. Bagadiong. The succeeding administrations of Dr. Asuncion V. Asetre and Dr. Minerva I. Morales, both scholars under the term of Dr. Rodolfo V. Azanza, would continue that pursuit for university-hood as they shared the same vision for the institution, thus, encouraging local leaders to initiate parallel legislative support.

Thereby, in support of legislative fiat to the institution, then Catanduanes Congressman Leandro B. Verceles Jr. initiated his complementary effort in the conversion of the College into a University during his first term in the 9th Congress of the Republic of the Philippines serving as the lone representative of Catanduanes from 1992 until 1995. The same fervor was passed on to the next Congressman of the Lone District of Catanduanes, Joseph A. Santiago whose term started in 2001, and who like his predecessors also worked hard for the conversion of CSC into a University. In short, all previous academic leaders and political stalwarts of the island, painstakingly laid the groundwork for the transformation of CSC into a University.

It was only on March 29, 2011, however, that finally the dream of every Catandunganon to have a University within the island would come to fruition when during the First Regular Session of the 15th Congress of the Republic of the Philippines, then Catanduanes Congressman Cesar V. Sarmiento with strong support from then Congressman Juan Edgardo M. Angara as co-author, filed House Bill No. 4170, entitled: "An Act Converting the Catanduanes State Colleges in the Province of Catanduanes Into A State University to be known as the Catanduanes State University, and Appropriating Funds Therefor." Over a year thereafter, President Benigno Simeon S. Aquino III signed on October 19, 2012 Republic Act No. 10229 converting Catanduanes State Colleges (CSC)-Virac/Main Campus and Panganiban Campus into Catanduanes State University.

The institution today, as it embarks into its new horizon of change under its newly-installed SUC President-III, Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza, rises to the challenge of an inclusive development paradigm. Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza opened the University to the public and encouraged its faculty, staff and students to get involved in the communities and serve the people. He ushered CatSU to operate under an atmosphere of servant-leadership, with competent and integrity-driven institutional culture towards the goal of transforming it into a globally-competitive green research university supported by PEZA-certified agro-industrial economic and processing zone in Panganiban Campus, and the Knowledge Innovation Science and Technology Park in Virac Campus under a BOR-approved comprehensive land use development and infrastructure plan coupled with a complementary blue print of CHED-approved smart campuses. Corollary to this, the institution's BOR on January 31, 2022 likewise gave its nod to eleven new curricular programs to be applied with the CHED, which include: Juris Doctor, Doctor of Medicine, MA in Nursing, BS in Public Health, BS Radiologic Technology, BS Medical Technology, BS Marine Engineering and Naval Architecture, BS Marine Transportation, BS Fisheries (Major in Ocean Science) and BS Textile Engineering.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

From Year 2021

CATANDUANES STATE UNIVERSITY

This year's Annual Report highlights the activities and milestones of the Catanduanes State University (CatSU) during the CY-2021. The Document captured the major strides of the institution along its threefold functions, namely: 1.) To provide quality teaching and learning; 2.) To conduct research, creative works and innovations; and, 3.) To deliver community outreach programs.

Conformably, the activities are subsumed within the Key Result Areas (KRA's) which are indicators in realizing the University's Vision-Mission statements anchored on the pathway of H.O.P.E. (pls. see separate section for details) under the current leadership

of Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza who was unanimously elected by the Board of Regents (BOR) as SUC President-III of the Catanduanes State University in the middle of the Reporting Year on June 24, 2021. In particular, this Report focused on the KRA's which looked into the specifics of the work pillars along: Quality and Relevance of Instruction (KRA-1), Research and Creative Works (KRA-2), Services to the Community (KRA-3), and Management of Resources (KRA-4). On the other hand, this Report also outlines the new President's Vision of HOPE, the First 100-Days Performance Breakthrough of the new SUC President-III, Significant University Events or Engagements in the Main

Campus, in the different Colleges and in Panganiban Campus, and the Board of Regents' (BOR) Resolutions passed within the period in review.

Education Institution (PHEI) in Catanduanes, its extent of achievement during the period points to its most pivotal journey as it marked its 50th year in 2021 ushering-

The major achievements along those areas provide the benchmark scenario underpinning the mechanisms in support to the Public Higher Education Reform, and other statutes, regulations and guidelines of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) and from other public institutions in the Executive, Legislative and Judiciary branches of government in the Philippines.

In sum, the Report relates with the integral development of the University, its internal governance, external partners, and student-clientele as well in its stewardship of the province's knowledge-base. As the premier Public Higher

in the University's recalibrated pathway towards innovative reforms within the scorecard of Honor and Excellence under its newly installed SUC President-III.

PHYSICAL PERFORMANCE

In general, the University posted an overall accomplishment rate in its identified MFOs of 151% in FY 2021, relatively higher than its GAA Targets.

KEY RESULT AREA 1: QUALITY AND RELEVANCE OF INSTRUCTION

Under the immediate watch of the Vice-President for Academic Affairs (VP-AA), this sector, notably within the sphere of Advanced and Higher Education Services Delivery, included in the reporting horizon are the eight (8) Colleges of: 1.) Agriculture and Fisheries, 2.) Arts and Sciences, 3.) Business and Accountancy, 4.) Education, 5.) Engineering, 6.) Health Sciences, 7.) Industrial Technology, and, 8.) Information and Communications Technology. Specifically, it weighed performance along the Institution's capacities in Student Affairs Servicing and Governance, student enrolment, graduates, faculty, PRC passing rate, accreditation, Center of Development or Excellence, and faculty scholars. Corollary to this were the performance inputs of support service arms on Instruction from NSTP/NSRC, Library Services, Alumni Services, Guidance, Counseling and Testing Services, and the Medical-Dental Services.

This sector likewise integrated the progression of basic education and related school infrastructure servicing through ongoing construction of the new Laboratory Schools Building and classrooms in the Main Campus where the latter under the period in review, has sustained its basic education service delivery catering to Grades 1-12, with tracks offered under the K-12 Curriculum. These are: ABM (Accountancy, Business and Management), HUMSS (Humanities and Social Sciences), and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics).

In Panganiban Campus, it sustained its three (3) baccalaureate degree programs specializing in Agriculture, Elementary Education, and Technical-Vocational Teacher Education, and one (1) Certificate Course.

Under the present stewardship of University President, Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza, which officially started in his unanimous election by the Board of Regents (BOR) on June 24, 2021, his leadership envisioned and laid-out proposal during his first hundred days in 2021 the target to open new curricular programs in BA English Language Studies, BA Filipino, BS Tourism Management, BS Electronics Engineering, BS Architecture, and BS Food Technology. For the year ended, the BS Architecture program was already opened.

The enrolment system and processes had been met with stringent challenges of the pandemic in two straight years hence; yet barring all perceived constraints, just to sustain mandated service delivery while underscoring at the same time the balance of ensuring safety health protocols of Covid-19. There were 6,547 total number of students enrolled in 2021 in the undergraduate level with enrolment

rate posted at 83%; whereas, there were 381 graduate students enrolled in research degree programs with 99% performance rate (381/386) for the institution against its 97% institutional and SUC level -5 benchmark targets. On the average there was a total number of 9,553 number of weighted fulltime equivalent students in 2021 over the 8,500 target for the year in review. The performance standard along this area in the SUC Levelling -5 has been pegged at 15,000 and above. Despite limitations of the pandemic, the University posted an uptrend rate in enrolment since AY 2016-2017 year up to the current period in review covering AY 2020-2021. (See Fig. 2, Enrolment Trend).

Notwithstanding challenges of the pandemic, the Advanced and Higher Education Service Delivery of the University during the year ended in 2021 sustained its momentum and learning standards that were subsumed across these instructional frontlines in the Colleges of: 1.) Agriculture and Fisheries, 2.) Arts and Sciences, 3.) Business and Accountancy, 4.) Education, 5.) Engineering, 6.) Health Sciences, 7.) Industrial Technology, and, 8.) Information and Communication Technology. In the Basic Education Service Delivery, it also maintained its quality pacing in flexible learning approaches due to restrictions on face-to-face classroom instructions in its Laboratory Schools.

In AY 2020-2021, there were an overall total of 422 graduates in the Main Campus in which the 50th Commencement Exercises of the Catanduanes State University Main Campus in Virac, Catanduanes on August 6, 2021 through online streaming considering prohibition of the face-to-face activities, carried the theme:" CatSU Graduates: Transcending the Challenges of the New Normal through Resiliency and Excellence in Education."

As of December 2021, data of the University's overall Employment Rate in the Baccalaureate Degree of its graduates (two years prior) was posted at 92% (1931/2103). In spite of the constraints brought by the pandemic, online tracking and other alumni-related activities were sustained by the Office to ensure continuity of its servicing during the year.

In Program Accreditation, there was 100% (25/25) rate of accomplishment of program accreditation in the undergraduate programs, and 64% (9/14) in the graduate programs way above the latter's institutional and SUC Level-5 performance benchmark target of both 50%. Accreditation remained an integral process during the year in review in sustaining the University's quality assurance of its program offerings, owing to its comparability standards with the rest of HEI's in the country. It spanned its reach across all eight (8) Colleges of the University with their respective programs subjected for AACCCUP Accreditation, and ensuring that COPC issuance from CHED for subject programs is in order as well.

The Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP) Inc. hence, accredited once again as part of the institution's regular quality assurance process in 2021, one (1) Graduate and six (6) Undergraduate programs under Level 1, five (5) Graduate and ten (10) Undergraduate programs under Level 2, and

two (2) Graduate and ten (10) Undergraduate programs under Level 3.

There were five (5) Graduate programs in the pipeline for accreditation as well, pending issuance of their respective Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) and other RQAT recommendations, the mechanisms of compliance of which are already in place for immediate accreditation. On the other hand, on the works still were only seven (7) Undergraduate programs for accreditation as the year in review ended. Moreover, there was a total number of 33 programs issued with Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) as of December 2021 with corresponding accomplishment rate of 71% (23/32) for the undergraduate programs, and 71% (10/14) for the graduate programs.

For 2021, the performance scenario of this sector points to the fact that the Institution as a whole and its Quality Assurance (QA) servicing remains steadfast and focused in ensuring relevance, comparability, and compliance with the dynamics of AACCUP and other regulatory standards endemic in State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) as further inscribed in the quality policy standards of CHED.

There was a sustained status of two (2) Centers of Development (COD) wherein one (1) is in Teacher Education Program of the University specifically for Bachelor of Elementary Education, and Bachelor of Secondary Education; and, one (1) in the Business Administration for the BS in Business Administration during the year ended in 2021.

For CY 2021, the University's overall performance in the National Licensure Examinations involving six (6) undergraduate programs was above the national passing rate as determined by the Professional Regulations Commission (PRC) for the year in review, namely: BS Agriculture (44%), BS Accountancy (33%), BEED (100%), BS Nutrition and Dietetics (100%), BS Civil Engineering (71.43%), and BEED-Panganiban Campus (100%). For the BS Nursing, Diploma in Midwifery (Main Campus) and BS Agriculture (Panganiban Campus) undergraduate programs, there was no licensure examinations conducted during the period on account of the pandemic, while there were only two (2) of which that posted below the national passing average such as: (BTVTED) or Bachelor of Tech.-Voc. Teacher Education (47.15%), and BSED/ BTVTED-Panganiban Campus (20%).

Summarily, based from the University's Planning Division data as of December 2021, the University's Overall Passing Rate for the period in review in the Licensure/ Board Programs with passing rate higher than the national average was 83% while 49% (88/174) for those first-time licensure exam takers who passed the licensure exam. S

On the part of faculty career and professional progression scheme, interventions through scholarships to pursue their respective learning and development opportunities via seminars, workshops, trainings, etc., and pursuance of their Masteral and Doctoral study completion within or outside the CatSU sponsorship

were assiduously sustained.

Thus, there were 992 total training hours attended by faculty and staff during the year in review, exceeding the 2021 institutional target of 500 hours for International level; whereas, there was a total of 3, 742 training hours attended by faculty and staff over the institutional target in 2021 of 3000 for National or Regional levels. The unprecedented move in the headway initiatives for faculty and instructional development program in the University within the half-term from June 2021 until December 31, 2021 covered in the reporting horizon marked a significant leap in the University laying the stalwart groundwork of development, reforms, and new initiatives for succeeding periods insofar as fulfilling the demands of providing Higher and Basic Education Services Delivery is concerned.

Worthy to note is that, in mid-2021 upon assumption of the University's SUC President-III, Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza, on June 24, 2021, apart from other re-calibrated institutional reforms as per indication in separate section of this Report (pls see First 100-Days Report Section), there was massive progression of new faculty hiring, promotions, opening of faculty positions and other faculty scholarship, learning and development opportunities undertaken within the span of the period in review.

As of December 2021, there was 100% performance rate in faculty hiring for Permanent status with relevant degrees required by CHED in respective subject areas they handle, while there were 16 of them who were granted scholarship in pursuing vertically aligned advanced studies.

To meet the pressing needs of the students, the faculty, and the institution itself, in particular during the challenging times of the pandemic, the library services of the University evolved aggressively to fine-tune and adapt its service delivery especially during the flexible learning modes, off-classroom and on-line learning dynamics. While effectively retrofitting its physical structures to adapt to the Covid-19 protocols and health standards for clients, its quick transition has put in place during the year in review some developments as well in terms of institutionalizing the digital scholar and e-learning resource center which maintained free access for clients to Science Direct, STARBOOKS, and Scopus, subscription to Gale OneFile, GALE e-Books, IG Library Publishing, and Access Engineering.

It had sustained likewise its quality management systems in the library servicing during the year, complementing the institution's AACCUP accreditation process, and the ISO 9001:2015 re-certification audit. For SY 2020-2021, its total circulation data revealed that a total of 1,610 book loans were availed of by students for their various assignments, research works and other academic requirements. Book circulation transactions from students in the eight (8) Colleges, especially, were consistently availed of and served, owing to the fact that they were introduced through CE Logic Orientation in the past period with the mechanisms of accessing to GALE and Access Engineering Database for various e-journals and e-books.

For the Guidance, Counseling and Testing Services, it complemented in the University's adaptation systems during the virtual learning and the pandemic scenario to ensure balance for students' intellectual and mental, psycho-social health. It kept track activities innovating services during the year, such as: Career Guidance, campaign for enrolment, jobs fair programs, processing student scholarships, counselling through individual groups, virtual orientation seminar for incoming college students through live streaming in Facebook, maintenance of GCTO Student Hotline for easy access of students' inquiry and other concerns, and other related activities to ensure that students are always on track in their studies, both physically and psychologically.

The Medical and Dental Services had been massively engaged on the frontlines during the year-ended within the onslaught of the pandemic. Understandably, the Office was responsible in overall institutional health protocol management and served as primary advisor in helping curb the further spread and effects of the dreaded virus, Covid-19 within the confines of the campus and among its inhabitants—the students, the teaching and non-teaching workforce, the clients and stakeholders, and guests as well.

In particular, the medical servicing at the start of the midyear on June 2021 under the new dispensation and assumption of its SUC President-III, Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza, innovative anti-Covid-19 health measures to mitigate its ill-effects were immediately installed in cooperation with the CHED, the Department of Health (DOH), the Local Government Units (LGUs), the Philippine Red Cross (PRC) and other agencies, NGOs and external partners, donors and stakeholders. Notably, the CatSU became the earliest among the Bicol SUC's to gain accreditation as Covid-19 Vaccination Center in Catanduanes servicing primarily its campus inhabitants and the rest of Catandunganons.

With that development, an immediate first vaccination roll-out on record that was followed suit with several other vaccination roll-outs later on August 24, September 3, 14, 22; October 1, 15, 20, 31; November 4, 5, 9, 10; and December 30, 2021; was conducted August 17, 2021 at the University Vaccination Center for the jabs of the first batch of 99 vaccinees from A-3, A-2 and A-1 vaccination priority lists that was administered by the University Medical-Dental staff, the CatSU College of Health Sciences Nurse Educators, with the able support of the local DOH, Eastern Bicol Medical Center (EBMC), Philippine Nurses Association, LGU and Rural Health Unit (RHU)-Virac, and the other University support staff in its administrative offices.

Overall, there were a total of 840 vaccinated CatSU personnel covering regular, casual/ job-orders and contract of service employees, with equivalent 98% vaccination performance rate of the University as the year 2021 ended, based from the combined report from Medical-Dental Services Office, and the Human Resource Management Office. Physical retrofitting and purchase of anti-Covid-19 paraphernalia, medical equipment and preventive kits

such as in-house anti-gen test kit, alcohol, face masks, face shields, alcohol dispensers, etc., following the IATF Medical and Structural Guidelines and Protocols to prevent the spread of Covid-19 in public establishments was also secured and provided to the Management for guidance, that was subsequently implemented with dispatch in the Main and in the Panganiban Campuses.

Among other regular medical and dental support activities in the campus, the following activities were likewise conducted during the year, such as check-ups, consultations, provision of medicines, medications, and information /advocacy measures on health concerns, particularly on Anti-Covid-19 safety protocols through social media, print, website, and broadcast. Flyers, tarpaulins, brochures, and streamers were also prepared and disseminated along these concerns. The schedule of regular disinfection in all offices of the Main Building was also set, while series of regular attendance to IATF (Inter-Agency Task Force) Meetings were likewise complied.

KRA 2: RESEARCH AND CREATIVE WORKS

Essentially, this sector ascribes to the optimal goals of the Institution along research and creative outputs published, disseminated, or presented; inventions, patents and copyrights, if any; researchers identified, research projects funded through external grants; Extension mileage in both quality and quantity measures in terms of trainings reached and conducted, technologies transferred, adopted or secured; technical assistance provided externally; publications and advocacies (print/ broadcast/online, inperson); Productions in terms of Income Generation Projects (IGP's) and similar entrepreneurial activities to support institutional income base, research-based Centers, specifically the University's Abaca Technology Innovation Center (ATIC), the Center for Climate Change Solutions, and the International Relations for Continuing Professional Development Center.

Under immediate supervision of the Vice-President for Research, Extension, and Production Affairs (VP-REPA), this sector serves as a fundamental entity in the life of the University, in sustaining its research culture and be embedded as such with other reputable research-oriented Colleges/ Universities in the country and possibly in other parts of the globe.

For the year in review, there were 49 Research Proposals submitted, 35 completed researches, and 32 presented researches where 14 of which were in Institutional, 12 in local, and 6 in International venues. There were also 12 published researches, and 7 Patenting of Inventions where 5 of which were under Utility Model category as certified by IPOPHL and 1 under Copyright category which went above the institutional target of 1 and the SUC Level -5 benchmark target of 1 for every 3 years. Additionally, there were 14 Internally-Funded and completed researches presented in the 2021 Annual In-House Review. Research citations went up to 109 from the target of 20 in 2021. Research publication performance rate was up to 34% (12/35), and involved faculty researchers rose to 51% (20/39)

accomplishment rate against the institutional target of 30% and 35% in the SUC Level -5 benchmark for 2021. There were 9 research outputs utilized in 2021 spanning the last three (3) years for use of industries and other beneficiaries in which it exceeded institutional and SUC Level-5 benchmark of 2 targets, respectively.

Relatedly, as of December 2021, there was 54% (20/39) accomplishment rate for faculty researchers, way over the 40% performance benchmark for SUC Levelling-Level 5 and that of institutional target of 20% for 2021.

Series of institution-based research and development activities such as committee meetings, technical research evaluations, UREC planning and conferences, stakeholdership conferences, negotiations and agreements, particularly with PCCARD projects, mentoring seminar-workshops, consultative meetings, and research trainings particularly on research proposal fine-tuning, Catandungan Studies, Intellectual Property Master Class, etc. were also conducted within the span of the period in review.

So far, four (4) Research Centers have been sustained institutionally surpassing both institutional and SUC-Levelling targets of 2 for 2021 while continual progression of research publication in CHED accredited journals, Elsevier Scopus, Thomson Reuters journals, among others, were maintained during the year in review to 34% performance rate (12/35) over institutional target rate of 33% and the SUC Level-5 benchmark of 30%.

Under the present dispensation, the Research and Development agenda of the University had been scaled-up innovatively starting the mid-year Reporting Year of 2021, with the complementation of Social Sciences, Arts and Culture research dimensions vis-à-vis Science and Technology-based research ventures.

Responsive to the needs of society holistically, for the year ended in 2021, the Research and Development performance window presented new paths towards pacing with relevant local, regional, national and global imperatives; thus, keeping in place strong institutional foundations among its faculty (and non-faculty) and student researchers to establish a culture of research in the University, said to be its soul and life-blood as well.

KEY RESULT AREA 3: SERVICES TO THE COMMUNITY

Extension service delivery holds one of the key pillars of the University's socio-corporate stature and community immersion activities, technical services and technology share anchored particularly on research addressing social development gaps. This particular component carries the social infrastructure development aspect of the University clientele outside its confines, bringing within their fold the institutional knowledge and technological base to help them improve their lot. This primarily features in general, the rural development paradigm, specifically shown through alliance building, establishment of social capital, social infrastructure development through trainings, technology transfer, value reorientation, enterprise

building, entrepreneurial and skills enhancement, environmental drive and advocacies.

For the year in review, the Extension arm of the Institution in its percentage of beneficiaries who rated the Office's training courses as satisfactory or higher in terms of quality and relevance had 100% rate (3094/3094) over institutional target of 80% in 2021. The global populace covered in terms of trainees trained for the year in review had a total of 5,106 over its target of 2900, making up a performance rate of 178% across 11 localities in Catanduanes as beneficiaries served; whereas, there was 100% rate of performance or 10 extension programs organized and accomplished for the year that were aligned with the University's mandated and priority programs vis-à-vis the target of 10 for the year in review.

Insofar as linkages and partnerships is concerned, the sector gained 17 of them with LGUs and other partners or stakeholders resulting from extension activities in 2021. There were 6 partnerships that were covered by either MOA or MOU recognized by the BOR for the year; wherein, 1 of which is with International, 2 with National and 3 with Regional Organization.

On the Income Generation Projects in the University's Production arm, the gained income from Poultry /Broiler Production rose to P136, 650.48 for the year ended, P447, 135.69 from Merchandising, P89,163.29 from Photocopying Services, and P717,543.53 from Rental Services.

KEY RESULT AREA 4: MANAGEMENT OF RESOURCES

The good governance principles owing to the practices of transparency, accountability, respect for the rule of law, effectiveness and participation point to the fact that the University has continuously adhered to during the year in review under its present leadership.

Within the purview of Management of Resources as another work pillar under review in 2021, it is noteworthy that in terms of organizational development and human resource capability/ professional enhancement, the institution posted a windfall of non-teaching placement to regular status of former temporary workers in the University and those from lateral transfers and /or new entrants. This came upon massive inventory of long, unfilled vacant items subject for filling-up either by vertical placement (promotion) or new hiring. Commencing June 2021 upon assumption of the new SUC President-III, and as of end of Reporting Year on December 2021, there were massive filling-up of vacant positions in the regular non-teaching workforce, apart from that of the faculty workforce reported earlier in this Report. There were likewise spill-over promotions within the ranks as a result of this personnel movement in the non-teaching staff that were promoted likewise as of December 2021.

BAC Reorganization, Bidding transparency procedures, progress billing on big-ticket infrastructure projects, PMC Reorganization,

Audit Inventory of On-Going and Implemented Projects, "No Backer-Endorsement Policy on Recruitment", Open-Door Consultative Management Policy, Meritocracy Policy on Hiring and Promotions, Provision of Students' Desk to Manage their Own Resource, were but some of the pioneering moves beginning the mid-year of 2021 upon assumption of the new SUC President-III in terms of retrofitting and recalibrating the Good Governance Practices and Management of the Institution.

On the other hand, budget utilization is another vital measure of the organization's absorptive capacity vis-à-vis systematic allocation and appropriation of financial resource as aligned with its target and expected output and outcomes.

It is noteworthy that the University had satisfactorily complied 100% with the public financial management reporting for the year in review by end of December 2021 covering good governance conditions in maintaining Transparency Seal, PHILGEPS posting, Citizen's Charter, SALN, Compliance to COA Audit Recommendations, and Posting of System of Ranking Delivery Units.

There was also 100% compliance in posting of status of infrastructure projects and those of projects awarded and completed in the Agency Website within the prescribed time-frame. This means that there was substantial level of efficiency and effectiveness shown

in complying with reportorial requirements of the Commission on Audit (COA) and the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) to the institution.

In terms of Obligations (BUR) computed as Obligations against all allotments still effective in FY 2021, both continuing and current year from all appropriations sources, including those released under the GAA as the allotment order policy for MOOE ad capital outlays in the given year, the institution posted its 97.89 % utilization accomplishment rate for the FY 2021.

On the other hand, its Disbursements (BUR) which is measured by the ratio of total disbursement (cash and non-cash, excluding personnel services) to total obligations for MOOE and capital outlays for FY 2021, posted 75.59 % rate of accomplishment for the given year.

Moreover, an accomplishment rate of 97.74% client satisfaction was posted during the year in review involving students and personnel who rated non-academic related services as either good or better. Whereas, it gained 100% accomplishment rate in 2021 having gained Valid Certificate until December 17, 2024 for Quality Management Certification or ISO-aligned documentation of agency QMS (Quality Management Services).

Message of the Dean

Academic Year 2021-2022 surely was full of challenges, new experiences and happy memories for the College of Agriculture and Fisheries. With the appointment of the new SUC President III, Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza, came his vision of HOPE, making significant and genuine reforms in our processes and standards in the University to become a globally competitive research University and achieve the goal of providing quality instruction to the youth of Catanduanes and uplift the lives of every Catandunganon.

With the Covid-19 pandemic still a reality to be dealt with, the faculty members of the College had to adapt to the flexible/blended learning modalities in order to effectively share knowledge and instruct the studenWts. Measures were put in place to support student needs and facilitate communication between students and faculty members. With regard to the facilities of the College, there are on-going construction projects to ensure all students will be comfortably accommodated following proper health and safety protocols in readiness for the face to face classes.

At the start of the academic year the College received the following machineries from the Department of Agriculture Regional Office V:

1 unit Holland farm tractor, 1 unit Kubota harvester, 1 unit shredder, 1 unit composter

A training-workshop on Biological Treatment of Abaca Diseases was conducted on October 20-23, 2021 by the College with participants from various LGUs of Catanduanes and farmer stakeholders. An ongoing evaluation study of the treatments used in the workshop is also being conducted by faculty members of the College.

Graduates who took the November 2021 Licensure Examination for Agriculturists got a 44.4% passing rate for first-time takers which was higher than the overall national passing rate of 35.30% for first-time takers of said examination.

The College has started a working relationship with Grameen Foundation in its extension efforts. A partnership with Landbank of the Philippines was also formed to conduct Financial Literacy Programs in different municipalities of Catanduanes.

A busy as the previous year has been, the College of Agriculture and Fisheries will continue to strive to advocate for sustainable bio-agricultural technology development to improve the lives of the people of Catanduanes.

That said, I am confident that the College of Education will be able to overcome any challenges that will come our way because our teachers have demonstrated their commitment with or without pandemic. We are all praying that the face-to-face classes will be realized this coming school year. We are very optimistic that this coming school year will be a fruitful and meaningful year for all the stakeholders.

Message of the Dean

The College of Engineering (COE) was opened a year after the establishment of the Catanduanes State Colleges in 1971 through RA 6341 authored by Congressman Jose M. Alberto: This converted the Virac National and Agricultural Trade School (VNATS) into the Catanduanes State Colleges (CSC).

The CoE started by offering the 2-yr General Engineering program and in 1977, the Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering (BSChE) was offered but was phased out by CHED in 1987 after graduating several chemical engineering students. It was only in 1979 when the Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering (BSCE) was added in the program offerings. In 1992, the province was stunned by the news of one local graduate Edwin Ogerio, capping the first place in the Civil Engineer Licensure Examination. A string of board placers followed his feat with a total of twenty five (25) board placers, three of them being topnotchers produced by the College. The scintillating performance of the College came when three students of one class capped the first, second, and third places in the CE board examination. This achievement placed the College of Engineering of the Catanduanes State University at the pinnacle of academic recognition not only in the region but also in the country. The CatSU Civil Engineering quiz contestants also placed first on several occasions in the region and in NCR notably in the Philippine Institute of Civil Engineers (PICE) National Quiz and UP ACES CE Quiz. These feats of the College of Engineering places the CatSU in the national roster of academic excellence. The 2021 Civil Engineers Licensure Examinations given by the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) in November, CatSU obtained a 71.43% for first time takers and 60.61% overall passing percentage way above the 36.67% for national passing.


The College is now on its eighth year of offering the Bachelor of Science in Computer Engineering. The BSCpE program was already submitted for AACCUP Level I Accreditation in May, 2021. The two batches of BSCpE graduates have found employment here and elsewhere with some being employed at the College of Engineering Dean's Office. At present, the CoE already has a three (3) story Engineering Laboratory building almost equipped with state of the art instruments and equipment for the BSCE and BSCpE laboratory requirements. The Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) for the two Engineering programs were already issued by CHED Regional Office No. V signifying that the Minimum Standard Requirements under the latest CMO were complied.

Our faculty and staff relentlessly pursues the goal of producing engineers who may compete in the wide area of the employment market. We will strive to live up to the legacy of excellence and consistency in the licensure examination in Civil Engineering as well as promote highly capable graduates in Computer Engineering.



After much effort of preparing the neccessary documents and indepth deliberation, the College of Industrial Technology was able to open a new program- Bachelor of Science in Architecture as per Board Resolution No.50 Series of 2021.

The Commision of Higher Education Regional Office-V issued Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) No.21 Series of 2020 to the Catanduanes State University which certifies that it has complied with the prescribed minimum requirements of CHED to offer BS Architecture (BS Archi) Program, per CMO No.61, Series of 2017-Policies, Standards and Guidelines for the Bachelor of Science in Architecture.

This program was implemented on the first semester of academic year 2021-2022

Opening of Another Shared Service Facility (SSF) Project: The FabLab



The Shared Service Facility (SSF)-Catanduanes Fabrication Laboratory (FabLab) was succesfully lauched on October 8, 2021 through the collaborative project of the Department of Trade and Industry as the implementing agency and Catanduanes State University as the cooperator. The Shared Service Facility is supervised and managed by Prof. Ma. Monette DR. Tugay. Fablab is composed of five machines and a software such as Markforged Mark TwoCarbon Fiber 3D Printer, ZMorph all-in-one 3D Printer, Anycubic 3D Printer, HanMa Laser Cutter Engraver, Ansys SPace Claim Software and Tornmach 24R CNC Router with complete accessories and software. This laboratory will serve as training ground for the teachers and students of CatSU who handle/study subjects related to 3D printing and the like.

On the other hand, the Shared Service Facility has existing Food Laboratory (FoodLab) which helps local food processors in mechanizing their production, practicing hygiene and sanitation, creating better packaging options, and standardizing the process and outputs. The facility also serves as production area of different food products and could also be utilized by the school's students and instructors as they pursue their food technology classes. These laboratories will be subject to donation by the Department of Trade and Industry to the Catanduanes State University once it completed two years of operation.

To eliminate the risk of COVID-19 transmission, the University adapted a simultaneous submission of Enrolment requirements by Incoming Freshmen students in eleven (11) municipalities of the Island Province, while an auto-enrollment system for higher year level students with satisfactory grades were taken care of by the CatSU - Management Information System.





Figure 2: Enrolment Trend




GRADUATES

FACULTY PROFILE





Figure 3: Annual Circulation



MEDICAL AND DENTAL SERVICES



The Catanduanes State University (CatSU) Personnel have received their first dose of vaccine against Covid-19 at the Eastern Bicol Medical Center (EBMC) yesterday, July 27, 2021. The said personnel, included in the government's A3 category (those with comorbidity), were vaccinated with Sinovac through the efforts of CatSU Medical and Dental Services headed by Dr. Felix III C. Ma in coordination with Provincial Health Office (PHO), EBMC and Virac RHU.

Dr. Ma mentioned that the next vaccination (2nd dose) for Sinovac will be held on August 24, 2021. It can also be noted that the first batch of employees vaccinated with Johnson & Johnson on July 22 are those included in A4 category, with a total number of 14 senior citizens.

All CatSU employees who received their shots expressed their willingness to be vaccinated and were screened in accordance with vaccination protocols of the Department of Health. According to Dr. Ma, "Vaccination against COVID-19 for the priority group must be done in order for us to achieve the target herd immunity". He further urged everybody to join the campaign against COVID-19 by getting vaccine and by following the minimum health standards set by DOH and IATF.

DOH gives thumbs-up to CatSU as first Bicol SUC accredited vaccination center

The Catanduanes State University (CatSU) main campus located at Calatagan Proper, Virac, Catanduanes has made history again as the first to be accredited as Vaccination Center among the rest of Bicol's State Universities and Colleges (SUCs).

Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza, CatSU President, made the announcement himself after the evaluation conducted through a zoom meeting on August 13, 2021 at the University gymnasium, the venue of vaccination site. The initiative was done in coordination with the local DOH led by Dr. Robert John Aquino, together with the Catanduanes Medical Society (CMS). Also in attendance were 50 Nurse educators and full-time Nurses as well.

The President thanked the management of Department of Health, as well as the Catanduanes Medical Society, and the Philippine Nurses Association-Catanduanes Chapter for the full support. According to Dr. John Aquino, DOH Representative, CatSU was declared as "Model Vaccination Center" as part of their evaluation results.

CatSU first vaccination rollout commences

CatSU employees were administered the first dose of Sinovac on Tuesday, August 17, 2021 held at the University Gymnasium after CatSU obtained the thumbs up of Department of Health as the first accredited Vaccination Center in the whole of Bicol's State Universities and Colleges (SUCs).

A total of 99 employees received the first jab, 97 of which are from the A3 vaccination priority list, 1 from A2 and 1 from A1. The registration promptly started at 8:00AM, and was very organized having a Counselling and Final Consent Area, the screening area, the vaccination area, and most importantly the Monitoring area. A hand wash area was also available right before everything else.

"It was a success! Not even a downpour of rain can stop us", said Dr. Felix Ma, CatSU Medical and Dental Services Physician when asked to describe the historical event. He also reminded everyone to avoid fake news, and rather listen only to health officials about the vaccine's safety. Dr. Ma led the event together with his Team and Nurse-educators of the College of Health Sciences, the Medical and Dental Staff, Building and Grounds Services for the gym set up and hand wash area, Guidance, Counselling and Testing Office, Public Relations Office, and all other offices who helped in this undertaking.

98% OF PERMANENT CATSU EMPLOYEES GET COVID-19 JABS

When the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) began considering the implementation of limited face-to-face classes in health-related courses in Higher Educational Institutions (HEIs) in the country despite the continuing coronavirus pandemic, the Catanduanes State University, led by President Patrick Alain T. Azanza, immediately pushed for the establishment of its own COVID-19 vaccination center inside the main campus.

Through its Medical and Dental Services / College of Health and Sciences - Nursing Department, the university coordinated with the Provincial Health Office and the Virac Rural Health Unit, as well as the Department of Health provincial office, the Eastern Bicol Medical Center, and the Catanduanes Medical Society (CMS) on how the vaccination center could become a reality.


Despite its limited number of personnel and equipment, the Medical and Dental Services staff led by Medical Officer III Dr. Felix III C. Ma managed to secure the cooperation of the Faculty of the College of Health Sciences-Nursing Department, nurse volunteer CatSU personnel, as well as the ambulance and rescue personnel of the Philippine Red Cross-Catanduanes Chapter and MDRRMO Virac.

With the Catanduanes Medical Society providing doctors and the EBMC staff, the MDS staff and CHS faculty, employees from other offices, and volunteer nurses successfully held their first vaccination rollout on August 17, 2021, inoculating 22 teaching, 35 non-teaching, and 41 JO/COS/Part-time personnel who belong to the A2 and A3 category.

Vaccination roll-outs were conducted on August 24, September 3, 14, 22, October 1, 15, 20, 31 November 4, 5, 9, 10, and December 30, 2021 bringing the total number of vaccinated CatSU personnel to 840




TRAININGS CONDUCTED



Bagamanoc, Catanduanes- A series of training on Financial Literacy were conducted for the farmers and fisher folks of barangays San Vicente, San Isidro, Antipolo, San Rafael, Sta. Teresa, Poblacion, Bacak and Bagatabao by the team of faculty extension workers from Catanduanes State University College of Agriculture and Fisheries (CatSU-CAF).

Financial Literacy is a flagship program of Landbank Countryside Development Foundation, Inc. (LCDFI) in collaboration with CatSU. This aims to uplift the socio-economic condition of individual farmers and fisher folks by making them productive and bankable through a lecture-workshop on Financial Literacy.

Suchan was the last barangay successfully served on September 11, 2021 at Suchan Elementary School.

The lecture include topics on: the financial status of the typical Filipino family; the classifications of family expenses, their sources of income, the importance of managing cash flows, as well as the various risks that affect the financial status of most farming and fishing families. A hands-on activity on analyzing cash flow and proper budgeting for their household and livelihood expenses was done after the lecture.

The CatSU-CAF extension team expresses profound gratitude to the Local Government Unit of Bagamanoc headed by Mayor Remegio B. Villaluna and the Municipal Agriculture Officer Mr. Emmanuel De Leon for the support and given during the implementation of the program from April 10 to September 11, 2021.



A Training Workshop on the Implementation of LGU-Baras Unified Communication System (Disaster Communication System) & Resilient Communication Infrastructure, was held last September 15, 2021. It was conducted by the Extension Service Unit of the College of Engineering, Catanduanes State University. The purpose is to train MDRRMO Personnel in handling disaster communication. Also to involve barangay official in the implementation of the unified communication system of the Baras LGU. Engr. Khalil Tapis, MDRRMO officer discuss the importance of the communication system in relation to their operations. Engr. The program includes the creation of local radio nets and trains the personnel in radio traffic handling and best practices in responding to emergencies and crises situation. To enhance the participant skill in communication handling, Engr. Llyod Yusores discuss VHF communication system and good operating practices. Engr. Mark Lester Rojas also talks about the Resilient Communication infrastructure and survivability of communication during and after typhoons.

During the training, Engr. Toyado emphasizes that an effective communications system reduces risk, loss of lives and properties in times of disasters. The training was participated by the MDRRMO personnel and barangay official, mostly punong barangay. The program was supported by Dean Pedro R. Arcilla Jr. Extension Director Adem Nalu Rubio and CatSU president Dr. Alain Patrick Azanza.



y election as the 7th President of the Catanduanes State University coincides the 50th Founding Anniversary of our beloved Alma Mater.

Upon my shoulders, God has bestowed the sacred responsibility of leading the largest higher learning institution in the island province of Catanduanes towards its first century of glorious history.

Today, amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, I am faced with the daunting challenge of putting the house of the University into order to make sure that we are all able to adapt to the new normal, embracing online technology and innovating blended and modular learning given the present limitations in the province where internet connectivity and intermittent power supply are but part of our day to day social and economic realities.

I have made initial steps in reforming the way we do things in the University. Already, we have put in place the hallmarks of my Administration: Transparency, Integrity and Accountability. Meritocracy, Equal Opportunity, Inclusivity and Fairness are my guiding principles for University governance. We emphasize an Open Door Policy where everyone can reach out to everybody, including the Office of the President. We have a 24-hour rule to make sure that doing business with the University is easy, thus we will act on your requests within a day. You must at least receive a feedback from us within 24 hours. Efficiency and Effectiveness are part of the University's Key Performance Indicators.

On my first few days, I made some shocking discoveries: 1) 100 plantilla faculty items unfilled for so many years; 2) the university has 250 Job Order staff versus only 232 faculty warm bodies, and the JO's have the same family or middle names, most of them recommended by only 4 powerful officers in the university, and sadly there were a number of cum laude and magna cum laude graduates who were mixing coffee or doing clerical or messengerial work instead of holding technical or teaching items; 3) I also learned that all our production ventures are losing propositions, the rice, poultry, eggs; but worse, 4) most of the infrastructure projects have negative slippage beyond the allowable threshold of 15%, one even at an appalling rate of 96% negative slippage, and this is happening alongside a series of contract variations that eat up whatever bid savings from authorized budget, yes negative slippage and contract variations have become the norm rather than exception.

I have sent out termination of contracts to this erring

suppliers who have made a mockery of public bidding process. Blacklisting is now in process. My experience as former BAC Chairman at UP Diliman tells me that this thing is a consequence when incompetent and corrupt suppliers and contractors are able to manipulate the bidding process and simply decide and internally arrange by themselves who will get the next contract. This fishy modus operandi, of course, will not thrive without colluding with corrupt officers from the inside. I am determined to cleanse the University from these practices. I am determined to cleanse the University of all these rotten and corrupt practices. I have announced that I do not accept SOP's and I think that has been made clear to all suppliers and contractors, as well as every staff and officer of the University.

But beyond housekeeping, the CatSU president under its charter that makes reference to Batas Pambansa 68 or the Corporation Code, is **expected to wear two hats**. One is that of an **Academic Administrator of the University**, and the other being the **Chief Executive Officer of the corporate organization** of the University managing its vast resources of about 335 hectares in Virac, Palnab, Cabugao, and Panganiban.

By promoting the internationalization programs and having strong foreign and national linkages, we can attract more academic partnerships and exchange scholarships. As an academic leader, we need to make sure that we are able to deliver high quality learning experience to our students. We need to benchmarks our curricular offerings and make sure we provide globally competitive knowledge and skills to our students. We also must promote the right values and character to our youth and we can do this handin-hand with active partners who provide spiritual growth and campus ministries.

I learned that 200 students of CatSU failed to enroll because of lack of access to online classes. I then called upon the private sector to donate to this needy students, and I am elated and so happy that the response of the generous public, perhaps because they have learned that we do not accept SOP's and resort to under the table transactions, has been very heartwarming. In the next few weeks, we shall be distributing smartphones or tablets to our needy students in time for the start of the next semester.

Our management audit and curricular reforms are already underway to make CatSU part of the Quacquarelli Symonds World Ranking of Universities; become SUC Level IV; and CHED Center of Excellence. We envision offering Maritime Courses, Law, Medicine, Medical Technology.





The Philippines is the largest abaca producing country in the world. Abaca or "Manila Hemp". It is considered as the strongest natural fiber in the world. It has high potential as substitute to glass fibers in multiple automotive parts or as filling materials for bolster and interior trim parts. Mercedes Benz has started using abaca in its automotive production. Catanduanes is the abaca capital of the Philippines, with 12, 789 abaca farmers producing an average of 23,550 metric tons per year supplying about 35% of the country's abaca production. Abaca is presently well-

recognized as primary material for specialty paper products such as currency notes (Japan currency note uses 30% abaca); tea and coffee bags; sausage casing; cigarette filter; medical/food preparation/disposal papers; high-quality writing paper and vacuum bags. It has also shown international potential in fashion, furniture and decorative industries. Average export generated by the Philippines is \$97.1 million per year for the past 10 years. \$84.9 million of that came from abaca manufacturer such as pulp, cordage, yarns, fabrics and fiber crafts.

Imagine if we do that in our export processing zone in CatSU, with tax incentives and at competitive labor costs that will provide employment to our Catandunganons.





Lasa or Tiger Grass is another area of research and production. Lasa is used to produce brooms. But its pulp is actually used in the nutraceutical-beauty industry by companies like L'Oreal.

Crab is another area of production. There was a time when we were also known as the "crab capital of the Philippines." We have the Catanduanes Crab Center. This has an international market and our female mud crabs are in demand in Japan, Taiwan, Hongkong and Singapore. Halal production of fish and crab products is another potential area.

Clustering of the campuses under the Comprehensive Campus Modernization and Development Plan. We will concentrate specializations that will boost economies of scale. For example, Panganiban Campus can became a center for Agricultural, Fisheries and Maritime Studies. While the Virac Campus can focus on liberal arts, medical sciences, nursing, education and engineering as well as the Graduate Studies. The Cabugao property can be a center for research on Mangrove and acquatic studies. Of course the Palnab area is definitely for Fisheries. The smooth transition shall take into consideration shuttle buses and dormitories for students in the said specialization campuses.





The CatSU Comprehensive Development Plan shall be on a 70-30 percentage scheme. We will set aside 70% of the 335 hectares for the future of the next generations. Thus, there will be natural reserve parks. The 30% will be developed into Smart and Eco-Friendly Campuses where we will utilize wind and solar technologies to serve as alternative sources of power within the University. There shall be housing facilities for faculty and staff; as well as ample dormitories for students. It will be a wired University where wifi and internet services will be adequately provided. The University classrooms, libraries, laboratory, research and production facilities shall be modernized, along with the rise of economic and processing zone facilities in a carefully planned environment.

There will be a teaching hospital and along with it, medical tourism and a nursing home for retirees. We shall put in place nature parks, and modern sports facilities for our students and campus residents. And we will not forget to highlight the Catandungan Culture and the Arts, as they are food for our soul. The Abaca Festival and other cultural activities to be spearheaded by the Hablon Dawani and the Catandungan Cultural Center of the University shall play a very important role in promoting our island's cultural heritage.



FIRST 100 DAYS HIGHLIGHTS All in life is a journey. The Catanduanes State University (CatSU) in its 50th year in 2021 marked a meaningful passage towards its new era of HOPE, which stands for its newly installed SUC President-III's governance compass from June 24, 2021 onwards. As the University's GOLDEN YEAR PRESIDENT, that distinction spells beyond appointment. It is called Providential and a Destiny.

Hence, the First 100-Days of Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza since then as the University's servant-leader, laid down defining pathways towards Honest service, Outstanding and globally- competitive educational standards, People-centered and planet- friendly programs, and Equal opportunity and fair treatment. It is summedup appropriately as HOPE towards the

University's new chapter of PROVIDENTIAL GREATNESS AND DESTINY.

Moving forward, swiftly and promptly, but undaunted by the challenges of INNOVATIVE REFORMS towards a NEW ERA of the CATANDUANES STATE UNIVERSITY, the new President working under the scorecard of Honor and Excellence made tremendous waves in just 100-Days never before felt in the University's history—a fitting tribute to its 50th year of existence in Catanduanes as a premier Public Higher Educational Institution (PHEI). And henceforth, destiny unfolds itself in a myriad of "firsts" and breakthroughs of Dr. Azanza's leadership as it navigates dramatically in the following hundred-day milestones.







The very first step of the service journey: THE STUDENTS' WELFARE. Dr. Azanza on July 1, 2021 met with student leaders and their respective organizations in the campus where the President lent his listening hour to their needs, issues and other concerns. For the first time, a STUDENTS' DESK was installed right in the Office of the President, an innovative gesture of the Institution's recognition of students' foremost right to be heard, to be part of governance, and to be dynamic in their part in Institutional affairs. The students after all, are penultimate reason for the school's being.



Sourcing-out external support from various sectors—the agencies, legislative through Sen. Kiko Pangilinan, private initiatives, etc.—to augment Students' IT Learning Tools especially during the time of pandemic in their online learning modes. For the first time, 565 of donated SMART TABLETS given for free to CatSU college students were distributed in several batches and channeled through the Board of Regents (BOR) student representative, Hon. Renz Mickenly T. Tanael in turn-over rites witnessed by key school officials.











Establishment and turn-over to the students through their representative in the BOR, Hon. Renz Mickenly T. Tanael, of SMART STUDENT CENTER, the first of its kind, in the Main Campus. The activity was witnessed by Student Services Director, Prof. John Cyrus B. Francis, Arch. Jose Ong and Engr. Rafael Manoguid to help ensure integrity of the premises and the infrastructure provided for the students which also include Internet connectivity in the area. The event was a sequel to the President's TURN-OVER OF STUDENT FUNDS to the Office of the Student Regent, purposely to give them full autonomy in managing their own funds, subject to COA rules—also a pioneering Management initiative in terms of student empowerment in shared governance approach in the University.

STUDENTS AND FACULTY DEVELOPMENT: A FACULTY ORIENTATION PROGRAM, also a pioneer move of his Presidency, was held July 27, 2021 at the University Conference Room. For the teaching fold, the new leadership sent a straightforward avowal on teaching: "That it is a Vocation per se...and Empathy is what's needed most for students." It likewise signaled the first wave of hiring reforms in the University for quality entrants especially in the faculty, encouraging at the same time those honor graduates in College where Meritocracy plays its best in the process.











Launching and securing INSURANCE PLAN for students, faculty /employees of the University on October 2, 2021. As another first initiative, the move addresses urgent issues of the pandemic which continue to haunt everyone, especially those within the academe. It is viewed as a forerunner project for the Institution which under this leadership as its pioneer, aims to cover annually with P100,000.00 per beneficiary for accidental death or permanent disability, P1,000.00 /day for maximum 10-day hospitalization or daily hospitalization benefit of P250.00 for a maximum of 15 days for Covid-19 illness.













The University doesn't rest in a vacuum as shown in its new leadership's pathway of Governance and establishing dynamic networks—extending its reach to where it is needed most and to where it is called to be partner for academic and community development. For the first time, as its members professed, the TODA members (Tricycle Operators and Drivers Association) in the campus were met by Pres. Azanza on July 15, 2021 right there in their parking site along the busy streets outside the campus where they talked freely on mutuality benefits. Going further, another first move of the Management that aimed to secure such partnership was providing them a MOA (Memorandum of Agreement) in giving them equal access to scholarships and the like to their dependents or children /relatives at CatSU. In exchange, the TODA will likewise provide rapid response and active participation on transport services and/or emergencies and disaster operations of the Campus and its constituents.





COMMUNITY DIALOGUE: Pres. Azanza on July 24, 2021 went his way out of the campus to share his presence in behalf of the University with the Barangay Local Government Unit (BLGU) of Calatagan Proper in Virac led by Barangay Captain Antonio Reyes. The consultative meeting with the Barangay Officials of Calatagan Proper where the Main Campus is situated, forged for the first time, a proactive disaster response strategy mechanism between CatSU and the Barangay concerned that will have mutuality of undertaking and resource sharing before, during and after occurrence of calamities or disasters. Key issues of cooperation involved those of provision of relief, emergency kits, youth education programs, student and faculty security residing in the vicinity, environment-related matters especially on waste management.



HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT: A momentous first in the massive and historical movement of new appointments, hiring, and promotion of both teaching and non-teaching personnel in the University has been thoroughly and systematically addressed since Day One, based on the tenets of equal opportunity and meritocracy. Thereon, series of filling-up vacant positions that were otherwise left unfilled years back, have been implemented strictly under a "rank-one, competent-based, no-backer/ no-endorsement" hiring and promotion policy."











DREAM TEAM: Pooled support and talents that will help the leadership of the new President craft its productive way forward in charting to fulfilment the development goals laid down for the University. Thus, the first of its kind MANAGEMENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (MDP) on July 15-16, 2021 was organized by Dr. Azanza for all designated officials of the University, meant to revitalize existing human resource and draw them towards a dynamic shift of productive engagement in their respective roles guided by the new President's working mantra of HOPE.

First in the island province of Catandunes among Higher Education Institutions, and one of the earliest in Bicolandia to be granted among its State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) with ACCREDITATION AS COVID-19 VACCINATION CENTER on August 13, 2021 where Dr. Azanza moved assiduously for its approval as a good relief for Catandunganons and the CatSU constituents in battling Covid-19. The initiative was made possible in full support of and coordination with the Department of Health (DOH) Provincial Office led by Dr. Robert Aquino, the Catanduanes Medical Society, and the Philippine Nurses Association-Catanduanes Chapter.








RETIREES' HAVEN: The Institution, again for the first time, has no longer become an institutional past for its retirees. On August 26, 2021, Dr. Azanza inducted into office the officers of an organization he himself conceptualized and organized as 'SAMAHAN NG MGA GURONG RETIRADO AT KAWANI SA CatSU' or 'SEGURADO KA SA CatSU' led by former CatSU Professor, Mr. Armando Zafe. This association as the name signifies, is composed of retired faculty, teachers, officials and employees of the University that will have its own office built inside the Main Building. It is aimed to work in partnership with various development endeavours of the school where retirees could still find useful engagements. Dr. Azanza rolled-out support packages for the group such as organization of their own cooperative, nature park, retirement home tentatively eyed in Bislig, San Andres, Catanduanes where an available lot is ready for disposal.





HOUSING PROJECT: No doubt, this project installed as swiftly for the first time, would be one of the University's by-word for posterity as Pres. Azanza together with Alumni Regent, Atty. Ramil Joselito B. Tamayo, visited model houses in Cavite on September 26, 2021 in preparation for the on-going Housing Project of the University under this dispensation. Later, the project rolled-out 70 slots made through lottery by the CatSU Employees' Association and the Faculty Union to give fair chances to all interested CatSU availers of either single-detached or row housing units designed as typhoon and earthquake resilient.





ECONOMIC ZONE: To cap the hundred-day service journey, and to mount over the historic 'firsts' in hundred-days of his term, Dr. Azanza started to fill-in his governance pledge to the University since his intent to the Presidency of installing Agro-Industrial and Economic Zone; and the Knowledge, Innovation, Science and Technology (KIST) Park at CatSU. Gaining full support of the province's top leadership, Governor Joseph C. Cua and Congressman Hector S. Sanchez, who himself sponsored a Bill in Congress for such particular purpose, Dr. Azanza filed the project's application to PEZA led by Director General Charito B. Plaza on September 21, 2021.







APPROVAL OF CatSU ECO-ZONE: During the first week of October 2021, Director General Charito B. Plaza of the PEZA together with select staff, made an official visit to the island province of Catanduanes, specifically for the CatSU's Agro-Industrial, Economic and Processing Zone that gained PEZA's approval under the stewardship of Dr. Azanza. The top-two leaders of the province, Gov. Joseph C. Cua and Congressman Hector S. Sanchez, were likewise present with Pres. Azanza during the arrival ceremonies for the PEZA party led by Director Gen. Plaza. CatSU becomes the second in the country to have gained approval of proposed Economic Zone and KIST Park.
