# **ABOUT CATSU**

atanduanes State University's beginning dates back to une 18, 1961 when Republic Act 3398, which called for ne establishment of Virac National and Agricultural Trade chool (VNATS), was enacted.

'en years thereafter, Republic Act (RA) 6341, which was authored by Congressman Jose M. Alberto, converted (NATS into Catanduanes State Colleges (CSC) on June 19, 971. CSC started functioning as an educational institution in December 1, 1971, initially offering courses such as associate in Business Education, Associate in Commerce, lachelor of Science in Education, and Master of Arts in iducation, and Master of Arts in Commerce. Additional ourses were offered on July 8, 1972 by virtue of RA 6590.

1 1996, Catanduanes State Colleges conformed to lepublic Act No. 8292, which provides for the uniform omposition and powers of the governing boards, the nanner of appointment and term of office of the president and chartered state universities and colleges, and for other surposes.

In October 31, 1999 the Catanduanes Agricultural and Industrial College (CAIC) was integrated to the Catanduanes Itate Colleges. This is Pursuant to Special Provision 10. 2 of the CHED FY 1999 Budget under the General appropriations Act of 1999 (RA 8745 or the Integration of CHED Supervised Institutions Universities and Colleges). Subsequently, by virtue of Board Resolution No. 15, s. 2003 hat called for the implementation of the to State approved and the Revised Organizational Structure, CSC-CAIC Annex was renamed as CSC Panganiban Campus.

The past Presidents of the CSC were Mr. Pedro G. Tabuzo. 1971 -1972, Dr. Jacinto A. Medallada – 1972 -1986, Dr. Rodolfo V. Azanza - 1986-1990, Dr. Adolfo S. Bagadiong 1993-2003, and Dr. Asuncion V. Asetre - 2003-2011. Meanwhile, Dr. Ernestina P. Averilla was designated by DECS Higher Education Division as CSC OIC from 1990-1992.

on July 14, 2011, Dr. Minerva I. Morales was elected as the fixth President of the Catanduanes State Colleges. When SC was converted into a University, she was designated by CHED as Officer In-Charge from December 12, 2012 -

March 24, 2013 in consonance with the provision of RA 10229. After topping the evaluation in the Search for CSU Presidency, Dr. Minerva I. Morales was subsequently elected through a unanimous vote by the Board of Regents as the First President of the Catanduanes State University on March 25, 2013 until July 31, 2020.

On August 1, 2020, Dr. Freddie T. Bernal, Regional Director of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) Regional Office No. 05, Legazpi City, was designated by the Board of Regents (BOR) as Officer-in-Charge (OIC)- President of the Catanduanes State University in its special meeting on July 30, 2020 through a Referendum Letter No. 4, s. 2020. Dr. Bernal served as OIC of the University until June 24, 2021.

During the special meeting of the Board of Regents of the Catanduanes State University on June 24, 2021 presided by CHED Commissioner and CatSU BOR Chairperson, Dr. Aldrin A. Darilag, the Board unanimously elected DR. PATRICK ALAIN T. AZANZA as President of the Catanduanes State University starting June 25, 2021. Dr. Azanza is currently the 7th President of the Institution since its foundation as a Public Higher Education Institution as then Catanduanes State Colleges (CSC) through RA 6341 on June 19, 1971 authored by the late Catanduanes Congressman Jose M. Alberto. Dr. Azanza currently serves his first four-year term commencing from his appointment on June 25, 2021 until June 24, 2025 or unless re-appointed for another term thereafter as the University's Charter provides under Section 9.

The conversion of CSC into a University formally started on March 29, 2011 when House Bill No. 4170 was filed during the First Regular Session of the 15th Congress of the Philippines. The bill was principally authored by then Congressman Cesar V. Sarmiento of the Lone District of Catanduanes, and co-authored by then Congressman Juan Edgardo M. Angara. Over a year thereafter, then President Benigno S. Aquino III signed on October 19, 2012 Republic Act No. 10229 converting Catanduanes State Colleges (CSC)-Virac/Main and Panganiban Campuses) into CATANDUANES STATE UNIVERSITY (CatSU). Presently, Dr. Azanza likewise serves as its 2nd University President since the institution's conversion in 2012.



# xecutive Summary

s annual report highlights the activities and milestones of the Catanduane State University (Cat5U) in CY 2022 document captures the major strides of the institution along the following core functions. 1) to provide quality iching and learning, 2.) to conductresearch, creative works and innovations, and, 3) to deliver community ension and outreach programs.

Conformably, the institutional performance and activities were subsumed in the Key Result Areas (KRAs) sich are indicators in realizing the University's Vision-Mission-Goals-Objectives (VMGO) statement, namely. KRA-Quality and Relevance of Instruction), KRA-2 (Research and Creative Works), KRA-3 (Technical Advisory and munity Engagement), and, KRA-4 (Governance and Management. The major accomplishments along those eas provide the benchmark scenario underpinning the mechanisms in support to the Public Higher Education form, the CHED's Memorandum Orders (CMO's) and other regulatory statues of Higher Education in the illippines.

In sum, the Report relates with the integral development of the University, anchored in its new leadership's erarching development vision of HOPE (Honest service, Outstanding and globally competitive standards, Peoplemented and planet-friendly programs, Equal opportunity and fair treatment for all), its governance, partners and askeholders, students, and other clientele in the institution's stewardship of the province's knowledge base, a premier Higher Education Institution (HEI) in Catanduanes, the University's extent of achievement during a period points to its own niche and "credence that has been tested over the past four decades as a quality fucational institution."

# Y RESULT AREA -1: QUALITY AND RELEVANCE OF STRUCTION

This indicator covers the following items: arricular offerings, Enrolment, Graduates, Program creditation, Scholarships, Performance in Licensure camination, Student Services and Programs, Colleges, prary Services, International Linkages and CPD ervices, Guidance, Testing and Counseling, Sports ctivities, NSTP/NSRC, Medical and Dental Services, and Alumni Services.

Overall, these Colleges and the University aduate School in the Main Campus offered wider, d relevant programs attuned to CHED standards d global comparability. There were 16 combined ograms in the masteral, doctoral and diploma courses fered during the year in review in the Graduate hool (GS). There were nine (9) Colleges in the Main impus, with newly established Colleges - the College Science (COS), and the College of Humanities and cial Sciences (CHUMSS) all from their predecessor illege of Arts and Sciences (CAS). The rest were: llege of Agriculture and Fisheries (CAF), College of siness and Accountancy (CBA), College of Education OED, College of Engineering and Architecture (CEA), lege of Health Sciences (CHS), College of Industrial chnology (CIT), and College of Information and mmunications Technology (CICT). The University sustained its Basic Education service delivery eugh its Laboratory Schools that offers Grades 1-12, In tracks compliant with the K to 12 curriculum such ABM (Accountancy, Business and Management), HUMSS (Humanities and Social Sciences), and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). In the Panganiban Campus, there were three (3) baccalaureate degree programs offered specializing in Agriculture, Elementary Education, and Technical-Vocational Teacher Education catering to two (2) major fields in Electronic Technology and Food and Service Management.

For SY 2021-2022, there were 22, 758 enrollees across all educational levels covering those in the Basic Education sector to Advanced Higher Education sector. Specifically, enrolment in the Basic Education level was 646, in the Higher Education at 21, 238, and in the Advanced Education at 874. Compared with the previous five (5) years since SY 2016-2017, the enrolment rate increased remarkably as shown in the period in review for SY 2021-2022. Within the span of five-year academic years from 2016 until 2022, the University posted cumulative total of enrolment of 95, 235 disaggregated to women enrollees of 40,871 and men enrollees of 54,364. It could be gleaned from the data that the University posted within this five-year span its highest enrolment rate in AY 2021-2022 of 21, 238. With the onset of dynamic institutional reforms on key pillars of governance in the Institution under its new SUC President-III, Dr. Patrick Alain T. Azanza, the influx of upward enrolment trend gleaned from the past reporting period and onwards is noted and clearly foreseen.

Graduate data in AY 2021-2022 from both the Main Campus (Virac) and the Panganiban Campus

wed a total of 2,305 graduates where 1,270 whom were women, and 1,035 were men. The baccalaureate courses had the highest rate of duates at 506, followed by those graduated from iness and Accountancy with 341. Lowest number raduates based from the AY 2021-2022 data was ted from College of Health Sciences (CHS) at 32. Inparative data in a six-year span from AY 2015-2016 AY 2021-2022 showed a rising rate of graduates in the Institution. Insofar as data on employability traduates is concerned, as of December 2022, 476 duates from Batch 2019-2020 responded, where I or 90% were reported employed, while 46 or 10% hem were unemployed.

There were likewise 3 in Undergraduate level that was granted Government nority to Operate, while there were 8 pending ance of COPC.

Merit program with financial aid/ assistance. Overall, there were 3,987 grantees for CY 2022. During the first semester, there was 20.93% scholarship rate of availment against 10,290 overall student population while 19.35% for the second semester against the 9,427 overall student population. In the student development program, there were 2 student attendees in the National level training/ seminar while 3 in the local level. Various student activities were conducted representing co-curricular and curricular types on a monthly basis for the year through online and face-to-face.

In the Library Services, there were 238 titles and journals processed, 48 journals, 184 titles of students' unpublished theses generated for the year, while it maintained its e-resources or free access to Science Direct and Scopus. Total annual circulation was 4, 608 per Dewey Decimal category, and 41, 727 by College. There were also 43, 772 registered total users per section, with 34,940 in the Gale-Online database, 1,180 in the Access Engineering, and 342 in the Online Electronic Resource Logbook. Noteworthy was the installation of Digital Scholar facility or electronic research hub in the University Library on March 9, 2022 with 10 units of tablets for use.

In upholding continuously its academic reputation as to place the University in the world map of reputable Higher Educational Institutions, its International Linkages and CPD Services gained monthly milestones during the year, when it started as the sole-grantee /recipient in the Bicol Region of the (ACT-IHE) or the Access and Competitiveness through Internalization of Higher Education project implemented by the British Council and the CHED. There were at least seven Memorandum of Agreement /Understanding (MOA/U) undertaken with various higher educational institutions for internalization thrusts; established the Open University and its Office, participated in online/ on-site conferences, and jumpstarted the University's participation in the World University Rankings in the late quarter of the year.

On student welfare activities, the offices of the Guidance, Testing and Counseling; Sports Services, NSTP/NSRC, and the Medical/Dental Services were on point with their respective targets and achievements for the year. There were 25, 172 students served during the orientation, 3, 547 in the entrance examination, and 185 provided with counseling services. Career Guidance Awareness caravan was also conducted and various coordination meetings and partnerships for student development programs were undertaken. The CatSU Olympics 2022, a three-day event, was likewise held featuring the four powerhouse units of the University with Unit II composed of the College of Agriculture and Fisheries (CAF), College of Science (COS), and College of Education (COED) emerging as 2022 Champion. The

Gianan, RN, MAN.

# RESULT AREA -2: RESEARCH AND CREATIVE

This indicator covers the following items: pleted, presented, published, and cited researches; ented/ copyrighted, utilized research, research vities, ATIC and CICCS performance highlights.

For completed researches, the University omplished 143.75% against its annual target where f which were institutionally funded out of the 23 pleted researches. For all 11 Colleges, all researches ar met or exceeded their annual target as well.

There were 39 researches presented in arch conferences where 32 (82%) of which were ented in the CatSU's In-House Review of Completed parches, while 17 (18%) in International conferences gh online mode. There were none presented in regional and national levels. All Colleges met their

included International presentation. The Office of the Research and Development Services and the College of Education in the absence of their respective targets for international conferences, however, presented theirs in the International research conference.

For published researches, there were 14 of them that gained publication in refereed journals where 2 of them were published in SCOPUS-indexed journals. A total of 169 citations either by other journal articles or books were recorded during the year where 94.08% (159) were recorded from citations in other journal articles, and 5.92% (10) in books. Among which, the study of Tria (2020), "The COVID-19 Pandemic through the Lens of Education in the Philippines: The New Normal" gained topmost with 126 citations.

There were 11 Intellectual Property Rights (IPs) that were applied /approved, where three (3) of which were patents derived from researches of RDS, CIT and CE while eight (8) were copyrights from COED, CICT, and CHUMSS. A total of 22 research outputs were utilized under the CY 2022 performance record, all of which were used for instructions at CatSU with only CHUMSS meeting its target for the year. There were also two (2) annual in-house review sessions completed for the year, along with various seminars, trainings, conferences and allied activities conducted.

The Abaca Technology and Innovation Center (ATIC) conceptualized the establishment of Abaca Research and Development Center that will access external funding, continued technology enhancement researches and tie-ups with partner agencies, and collaborated in holding exhibitions and events to boost Abaca development program of the University.

The Center for Island Climate Change Solutions (CICCS) highlighted its major activities for the year with its exposures on multi-lateral basis with other expert and mandated agencies, HEIs, private and non-government entities and individual authorities on climate change, disaster management, environment, and geo-hazard management, among others. Meetings for the Project Eco-Shield with ICO Committee, conferences with DOST for Grants in Aid Proposals, Advocacy, and Forums were among those that were undertaken for the year.

# KEY RESULT AREA -3: TECHNICAL ADVISORY AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

This indicator covers the following items: Extension performance, Linkages/ Partnerships, Airlinks, and Other Extension Activities.

Activities of Extension Services for the year revolved on the new imperatives of HOPE in trying

It had established 11 community ges for the year encompassing all development is from livelihood, education, power, enterprise. I infrastructure, health, gender and development. ice and technology, agriculture, environment, biosity, climate change, sports, skills enhancement, I empowerment and leadership, among others.

Its Airlinks, a broadcast-based information emination activity of the Office likewise regularly fucted its air presence every week's airtime in a ernment-owned radio every Wednesday, with 29 radio broadcasts conducted for the year. There also 11 other extension services trainings conducted ving partner communities provincewide.

It also passed and approved through the Board of Regents (BOR), 13 Memoranda of Agreement/ Understanding (MOA/ U) with different agencies and Colleges/ Universities; 3 MOA/MOU specific on academic matters; and 13 for other specific purposes confirming MOA /MOU under administrative, academic and research and extension matters.

It had undertaken series of 12 Gender and Development (GAD) anchored activities through symposia, forums, and training alongside with three (3) special seminar-workshops in the campus. On Client Satisfaction rate for 2022, the University in the Main Campus gained 98.42% client satisfaction for Frontline services, and 98.88% for Non-frontline services. In general, the University obtained its high satisfaction rating equivalent to Very Satisfactory (VS) and Better based from the standard baseline rating of 85%.

As of December 31, 2022, there were 195 Permanent employees and 107 Temporary in the Teaching department, while there were 239 Permanent and 12 Temporary in the Non-Teaching department. Of the data among the total of 434 permanent employees. 52% of which are women, and 48% are men; while of the total 119 temporary employee, 55% of which are women and 45% are men. There were also 30 highlighted institutional events recorded during the year.



Data in Figure 1 and Table 2 showed progressive rate of enrolment of the Catanduanes State University (CatSU) both in the Main Campus and in Panganiban campus over the six-year span from 2016 until AY 2021- 2022. For the latter, the University posted its highest cumulative enrolment record during that period with 22,764 enrolees covering Advanced, Higher and Basic Education levels. Overall from AY 2015-2016 to AY 2021-2022, the University posted cumulative total of enrolment of 95,235 disaggregated to women enrolees with 40, 871 and men enrolees with 54,364. With the onset of dynamic institutional reforms on key pillars of governance in the University under the current leadership, the influx of upward enrolment trend from this reporting period and onwards is likewise noted and clearly foreseen.






This AY 2021-2022 graduation rites had a total of 2,305 graduates. During the ceremonies, Pres. Patrick Alain Azanza emphasized that this year's graduates are considered champions... and survivors because " it is but a culmination of all your sacrifices for several years, and also your triumph against Covid-19 pandemic," he said.

The President enjoined a moment of silence from the audience in his speech in memory of those who were gone during the ravages of the pandemic for the past years of its height. "Life is not a race...each one of us is having his (or her) own journey, and it is by remembering the values entrusted upon you by the University that we all hope (and your parents) that you will succeed," Dr. Azanza reminded the graduates.











4: Total number of Graduates (Advanced & Tertiary) per year

Data in Figure 3 presented the totality of graduates from the Main and the Panganiban Campuses during the AY 2021-2022 with cumulative total of 2, 305 where 1,270 of whom were women and 1,035 were men. They were from the seven Colleges in the Main Campus and that from the Panganiban Campus, where those who graduated from the Pre-Baccalaureate courses gained the highest posted rate of graduates (506), followed by those graduated from College of Business and Accountancy (CBA) with 341 graduates during the AY in review.




### MESSAGE OF THE DEAN


My vision and aspirations remain the same as when I started as the Dean that is for the College of Agriculture and Fisheries to achieve a remarkable performance in instruction, research and extension.




In sustaining this mantra, the College and its pool of faculty and non-faculty staff deserve all the appreciations of what the College has so far achieved exemplarily in 2022.











2: Breakdown of 2022 completed researches based on funding



As of December 31, 2022, the CatSU has accomplished 143.75% of the target completed research. This is equivalent to 23 out of 16 target completed researches of which seventeen (17) were institutionally funded while the rest were funded by the researchers themselves (personally-funded). These personally funded researches were submitted to the R&DS, and were evaluated prior to final acceptance for recognition.


4: Breakdown of 2022 researches presented on conferences.



Last year, thirty-nine (39) researches were presented in research conferences. Out of these, thirty-two (32) or 82% were presented in the CatSU's In-house Review of Completed Researches last March 17-18, 2022 and September 23, 2022, and during the CatSU Research Conference held on October 17-18, 2022. Meanwhile, the seventeen (17) or 18% of the researches were presented in international conferences held online. There were no researches presented in the regional or national conferences.

on the breakdown (Fig. 4), all colleges (i.e. CAF, CAS, CBA, COED, and CIT) with target number of thes to be presented on the institutional/regional conferences had accomplished their target. Only CBA met their target number of research presented internationally (100%) while CAS had only satisfied 50% target (1 out of 2). 









5: Breakdown of 2022 completed researches based on funding











table 58: total number of employees by status




Table 59: Permanent Employees by Sex





Table 60: Temporary Employees by Sex






